We had an appreciated call last Monday from Mr. Sebastien Roy, Sr. of St. Bernard parish. Mr. Roy came to New Iberia to visit the family of Mr. Henry Gallois. While in our sanctum, the subject naturally lead to highways and the gentleman who is the Road Supervisor of that Parish, informed us that St. Bernard has upwards of twenty-five miles of clam shell highways. He says he cannot understand why the citizens of New Iberia should pay such exorbitant prices for gravel when we have millions of barrels of shells within our reach that could be used for building our roads at less than one-third the cost of gravel. St. Bernard leads any other Parish in the State when it comes to having good public roads and their experience with shells has been more satisfactory than any material they have ever tried. Shell roads are so easily maintained, once the proper foundation has been given a piece of road and the heaviest kind of trucks navigate the roads of that Parish says Mr. Roy. With the completion of our canal to the sea we would be in position to get shells sufficient to maintain all of our highways. It is true every Ward in Iberia Parish has voted taxes to build highways, on the main roads, but it will only be a short while before a general tax will have to be levied to cover such sections where no provision has been made to build a road. In that event the canal to the sea, or even to Lake Fausse Pointe will make it feasible to get shells here at but little cost, other than transportation at one-third the amount we are now paying for gravel. Our people should not lose sight of this fact, and get busy on the two canal propositions. The amount paid for transportation of gravel alone would pay for the completion of the canal to the sea, and yet we seem to be neglectful of this great waterway.

On Wednesday morning the large residence of Mr. Tony Drago situated on Pershing St. took fire. Fortunately before the flames could do much damage the blaze was subdued.
