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LOCAL NEWS.

—Owing to the delay in receiving the commissions, coupled with the strong inclination on the part of some of the members to attend the convention at Baton Rouge the organization meeting of the Police Jury scheduled to take place this week was postponed until next Monday morning. Secretary Paul Bassin has everything in readiness so that no difficulty will be experienced in turning the affairs of the present Jury over to their successors.

—We had an appreciated visit last Monday from Dr. J. Stansbury the veterinarian of Jeanerette. Dr. Stansbury urged us to direct the attention of the incoming Police Jury to the condition of the public roads in the Eighth and First Wards. He is anxious that the incoming members get things into shape to commence the graveling which has been delayed so many months.

—Last Monday afternoon little Louise Barrow, the seventeen-month-old child of Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Barrow breathed her last, after an illness of a couple of weeks, casting a gloom, not only in her immediate household, but over the entire community. The funeral was conducted from St. Peter's Catholic church in the presence of a large circle of sympathetic friends.

—Last Monday morning during an electric storm at Avery Island, a colored girl by the name of Mary Robertson was instantly killed while sitting on the front gallery of her home. At the time she was struck there were several other people in the house, but none of the others suffered injuries. Coroner Fulton was called to the scene to hold an inquest.

—In a few days the show windows of Messrs. Schwing & Carstens will contain some beautiful fancy work executed by the bright pupils of Mount Carmel Convent. Almost every year some of the children of Mount Carmel display beautiful pieces of fancy work that are prized very highly.

—Last Tuesday the asphaltic concrete highway on upper Main Street was opened up to the public to the gratification of many of the property holders residing in that portion of New Iberia. This work was delayed for quite a while, owing sometimes to the shortage of material, other times to inclement weather until many of the residents whose property abutts the road would get awfully discouraged. Now that the work is finished every one is elated and the favorable comments we hear about the work is quite a feather for the Southern Roads Company who had the contract. Their machinery and material was at once removed to the East Side of the Teche and already the work of paving Duperier Avenue is under full headway. Asphaltic concrete may not be as durable as vitrified brick, but it is so much smoother and prettier that many of our citizens regret the entire Main Street was not of the same material. Be as it may it begins to look like all of the work will soon be under headway again in a few weeks. Mr. Ritchie, the brick contractor showed up in New Iberia a number of days ago, and according to Mayor Sealy several carloads of brick is now en route to New Iberia. The citizens of our City have been patiently waiting to see this important improvement resumed for some time and we hope they will not be disappointed in their expectations.

—An elaborate program consisting of recitations and music will be conducted under the auspices of Mount Carmel Convent by their bright pupils next Monday evening at 7:30 o'clock. A small admission fee will be charged the public. On the following Monday, June 14th the graduates of this popular educational institution will be awarded their diplomas at St. Peter's Catholic church to Misses Blanche M. LeBlanc, Rena Delahoussaye, Yvonne M. Dencasse, Ruby E. Romero and Louise M. Gonsoulin.

—Frank Walker, a respected colored man hailing from Boliver, Miss. came to New Iberia last Thursday in search of a negro fugitive from justice. Walker is well known all over the South as the only colored man commissioned as a detective and on many occasions he has run down some of the worst negro criminals in that State. He had with him a bench warrant for one, Will Harris, a wife murderer, and said that he would have him under arrest before many days. Walker called upon Sheriff Landry while here and said that besides being known by nearly every Sheriff in the South he was personally acquainted with the President of the United States. He has been following detective work for Mississippi for 38 years and some of his captures are of the worst type of criminals. While traveling over the country he sometimes delivers lectures to the people of his race on sanitation, the right mode of living and otherwise gives the negroes advice that is calculated to be of material benefit to them.

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On June 15th, Prof. Chas. M. Bahon, principal of the New Iberia High School, Miss Hilda Roberts, the teacher of mathematics and Miss Katherine Winters, the English teacher will leave for Chicago where they will take a three months course to attain the Master Degree at the University of Chicago. While in Chicago, Mr. Bahon will attend the big Elk Convention to be held there on July 8th.

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
