A special meeting of the Iberia Parish School Board was held at the office of the Board, Masonic building, New Iberia, La., May 17th, 1920 at 2 P. M. The meeting was held as per the following call:

To the Members of the Iberia Parish School Board:

Gentlemen—By order of President J. E. Verret, a special meeting of the Iberia Parish School Board will be held at the office of the Board, in the Masonic building at 2 P. M. on Monday, May 17th, 1920.

This meeting is called for the purpose of attending to the following matters:

(1) To authorize the borrowing of money sufficient to meet the next pay roll of the Parish teachers.

(2) To arrange for the appointment of teachers for the session of 1920-1921.

(3) To take up the matter of leasing the school land in the 7th Ward near Avery Island.

The roll call showed the following members present: Messrs. George Winters, Emile Dupuis, Gus Bonin, Jr., Telesphore Robichaux, H. R. Minvielle and President J. E. Verret; Absent, Messrs. E. P. Moreau, Albin Secura, Eugene Guillot, H. T. Hall and Dr. U. S. Perret. President Verret announced the presence of a quorum and the opening of the meeting for the transaction of business.

Mr. Minvielle moved that the President and secretary of the Board be authorized to borrow from the State Bank the Board's fiscal agent, or any other bank the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars on the note of the Board, signed by the President and Secretary, payable on or before June 30, 1920 with interest at the rate of eight per cent. from date, the Secretary being authorized to repay the same from the State appropriation for the month of June. The motion was seconded by Mr. Bonin and on being put to a vote was carried unanimously.

BAILEY DROPS OUT OF SENATE RACE.

Baton Rouge, La., June 2.—Louisiana's four-cornered race for the United States senatorship, lost one of its corners Wednesday morning when James J. Bailey, secretary of state, announced that he had decided to withdraw from the race.

"I entered the race on my own motion and I am withdrawing on my own motion," said Mr. Bailey. "I have not made any deal and I am not supporting any one of the candidates left in the race. My friends are free to support any one they like, and I desire to express my deep appreciation for their offers of support."

Mr. Bailey's withdrawal probably will be received with gladness by the remaining candidates. He entered the race three months ago, "without consulting anyone," and had received many assurances of support. A politician of the quiet type, he presented the unknown quantity to others in the race. They could not satisfy themselves as to how large or how small a figure he would present in the campaign.

Mr. Bailey is just beginning another four-year term as secretary of state, to which office he

was re-elected without opposition. Congressman Jared Y. Sanders, Edwin S. Broussard and Dineison Caffery are the three candidates left in the race. There are decided rumblings of another, former Governor Ruffin G. Pleasant; but he is saying nothing.
