It isn't necessary to go to church to hear a sermon on modern modesty—or its absence.


Pick up the Sunday edition of any big city paper and turn to the illustrated section.

PROCLAMATION OF ELECTION,

Pursuant to a resolution adopted by the Third Congressional District Committee of the State of Louisiana for the Democratic Party at a meeting of the said Committee held at Morgan City, Louisiana, according to law, on the sixth day of July, 1920, and the authority vested in me, by said resolution, a Primary Election for and in behalf of the Democratic Party is hereby called to be held on the Second Tuesday of the month of September, 1920 throughout the said Congressional District and throughout the Parishes of Assumption, Lafourche, Terrebonne, St. Mary, Iberia, Lafayette, St. Martin and Vermilion, said Parishes constituting the said Third Congressional District of Louisiana, for the purpose of nominating a candidate of the Democratic Party for the said District for member of the House of Representatives of the Sixty Seventh Congress of the United States, the nominee selected at such Primary to be voted for at the General Congressional Election to be held throughout the said Congressional District of the State of Louisiana on the —of November, 1920, and for the further purpose of electing sixteen members, two from each said Parishes of the said District to constitute the Democratic Executive Committee of the Third Congressional District of Louisiana. The said Primary Election is to be held under the General Primary Election Laws of the State of Louisiana, and more especially Act 35 of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana for the year 1916, and subsequent amendments thereto. Notice is further given that any person desiring to become a candidate at the said Primary Election, shall, within twenty days after the issuance of this call, file with the Secretary of State of the State of Louisiana, and with the Chairman of the Third Congressional District Committee for the Democratic Party, his written notification of his intention to become a candidate at such Primary Election accompanied by a declaration that he is a duly qualified elector under the Constitution and Laws of this State, and that he is a member of the Democratic Party. The notification and declaration filed with the Secretary of State by candidates for the Congressional nomination shall be accompanied with a deposit of the sum of One Hundred Dollars. The notification and declaration made to the Chairman of the aforesaid Committee by candidates for the Congressional nomination shall be accompanied with a deposit of the sum of Twenty Five Dollars to be used for the defraying of the necessary expenses provided for in the Primary Election laws of the State. In faith whereof, witness my hand officially at Morgan City, Louisiana, this 6th day of July, 1920. JNO. D. SHAFFER, Chairman, Third Congressional District Committee, for the Democratic Primary.
