JOSEPH FELS THE JEW.

Joseph Fels was a prosperous Jew. Protected by a robber tariff, he became a multi-millionaire, manufacturing soap in the city of Brotherly Love, founded by William Penn, the Quaker. Like Fenu, Fels had a kind heart, and for years did what he could to relieve the poor by almsgiving and charity. Finally he recognized charity for what it is—a disease—that upholds injustice and ceased to give in that way.

Later he began in England where also manufactured soap, to give men a chance to help themselves by giving them the use of vacant lots, was better satisfied with the result of his work—but he continued in the money-making game, for to him it was game, "so dead easy," as he used in his gay way to put it till the year 1906.

During that memorable year on a return trip from England he met Keir Hardie, the Socialist, and was very much struck with the dignity and loveableness of the man. Relating his experience and the long and intimate conversations he had with Hardie on the homeward-bound ship, he said afterward: "I talked of myself and what I had done; Keir Hardie talked of men." Every one recognized in him a man out of the ordinary, so forgetful of self, so thoughtful of others, and while I could not be a Socialist I knew and had known for the years that the real remedy for poverty was to be found in restoring the land to the people through the single tax.

Like Ernest Crosby, like Tom Johnson like the apostle Paul, from that day forth he was a changed man. He withdrew from the money-making business, and devoted himself heart and soul to the Christ-like life of saving men from the whirlpool of poverty. Friends and relatives went back on him; called him crazy and did not hesitate to tell him so. But having decided on what he himself thought the proper course to pursue, he never faltered or looked back.

From that turning point in his life till his death, in 1914, he gave most liberally to the cause not only in this country but in half a dozen European countries beside. He saw that crime came from the iniquitous distribution of wealth, from the over-rich and the poverty stricken, those who through our land system had been robbed of the fruits of their toil and those who through unfair privileges never tilled the soil. He claimed no man ever honestly made a million dollars, and again and again he said: "I want to make it impossible. I want to spend my fortune to make such fortunes as mine impossible."

He gave himself no rest. He spoke, he talked, he wrote, he worked in feverish haste, like thousands of other single taxers, in the hope of averting the terrible war which later broke upon us, till his early death in 1914, at the age of 54. In February of that year, with single-tax letters, data and literature scattered all over his bed, he literally forgot himself into immortality.

So died Fels, the Jew, an honor to both races. But it was only a passing. His name is a household word wherever the English language is spoken, the Jew and Gentile will honor themselves in honoring him for generations yet to be.

THE PROFITEER.

We are in great danger of forming a habit of regarding the per cent of profit of the past few years, no matter how abnormal, as desirable to maintain as a permanent return and to feel discontented if asked to share these profits with the Government or to so shade our prices as to fall back to the profit level of the pre-war years.

There is also a tendency to maintain prices and profits in order that, notwithstanding the tax demands, we may still retain as our share of the rewards of business a higher profit than we were accustomed to expect before the era of high prices began, and I wish to present this tendency most frankly for your consideration, and to set out clearly that unless certain principles are recognized and acted upon, our period of readjustment will be made exceedingly difficult and will witness many economic conflicts that can be avoided by an anticipating the limitations under which American business in the future, must operate.

The principle which we must recognize is a fair return upon capital actually invested, which return must vary with the risk incurred and is always demonstrable—liberal allowances for depreciation and obsolescence—liberal reserves to bridge periods of depression and stabilize employment.

Profits beyond these limitations cannot be justified as a charge against the ultimate consumer, and should be applied to the reduction of prices as a first step toward correcting inflation and restoring normal conditions.—Harry A. Wheeler in The Nation's Business for June.

COMING DOWN THE LINE.

The national election is moving to a settlement. A little more than four months more and we will know whether the present policies will remain or a change will create another condition.

There are many things to be done by the next administration, and one among that number will be the removal of the present internal income tax from the statutes. It is an outrage against the people and contributes the whole list of items against industrial development and progressive business transactions. It makes for indolence and creates a limited spirit of energy. A man with a family whose net earnings amount to anything more than \$2,000 a year must walk up to the counter and hand over a part of it. No living expenses can be deducted from the amount created by either brain or energy, or both. If he lives in a city, this amount can hardly sustain him and a small family and he is forced to live like a pauper in order to have enough left to pay the tax gatherer.

If his earnings reach considerably beyond the minimum amount, the tax levied grows larger until it reaches to about 66 per cent of the amount he is capable of creating with large business interests. High expenses and low cost of living is impossible. It simply cannot be made to fit.

Take a sugar planter or a farmer as an instance. He is always up against a continuous string of adverse conditions. Overflows, freezes, crop failure, destruction of seed, low prices and free trade. He puts in long hours every day in the year, with the hope of creating enough to feed his family, and under good conditions, he may make a little, but it can do him no good because the government comes in to claim the results of his hard labor, but if he makes a failure or happens to be unable to harvest his crop, he alone must stand the loss, and if he makes enough in another year to even

up his debts, he is prohibited from doing so because he must use it to pay his income tax, and he had the man who advanced him money and supplies, are left to hold the sack.

It was all right during the war for the government to draft against the cash resources of the country for the maintenance and well being of our soldier boys, and the people considered it a pleasure to lend a helping hand that Prussianism may be crushed from the earth forever, but that time has passed. The necessity no longer exists for the carrying of additional burdens, as unnecessary as they are outrageous, is the time to quit.

Representatives of both parties voted for the document because it was a necessity, and one party in the future must demand its revision. We should have an income tax, but not used for a confiscation tax.—St. Mary Banner.
