—The printing department of The Enterprise has been exceedingly busy this week supplying commercial work for different commercial firms in New Iberia. Amongst the vast amount of other work was the execution of a catalogue for the St. Peter Catholic College giving the pupils the history of the College as well as the numerous studies to be taught by the corps of able teachers beginning September 6th, 1920. From what we learn the enrollment has been largely increased, in fact it is very evident the buildings are inadequate considering the new addition now in course of erection. The foundations are already completed and just as soon as the contractor succeeds in getting the material the carpenter work will be under way.

—On Thursday morning, under the supervision of Officer Hebert, St. Peter and other streets that have been impassable for some time, commenced to receive attention, and as we write these lines there is already a decided improvement. Much of the dirt excavated on Main Street between the Court House and French Street was hauled by teams and dumped where it was badly needed thus affording the users of automobiles easy access to most every part of New Iberia. For many months, due to the heavy precipitation and exceedingly poor drainage there was hardly a road but what had holes in it that would bog every car that undertook to pass through them. Now, thanks to His Honor Mayor Sealy this condition is ameliorated. The fact that we are paving Main Street and planning to improve the other roads in New Iberia means more than ever that more attention must be given to the back portion of our City. With rains almost every day the proposition of keeping up the roads have been exceedingly difficult. When the excavation was under way on lower Main Street the dirt was hauled on Front Street over the Bayou, which was a very wise plan for the users of that thoroughfare and to-day that portion of New Iberia is very much improved. The remainder of the dirt will now be used where it is needed most and even though the paving on St. Peter is not completed within the next year, the residents will have a street that will be fit to travel at least.
