It will no doubt be several months before the construction of gravel highways is under full headway, but by the middle of 1920 a large per cent of the contemplated roads should be completed.

**WORK IN THE GARDEN FOR OCTOBER.**

The ground ought to be occupied with all varieties of fall and winter vegetables, however it is not too late; all variety of vegetable seeds sown last month can still be sown.

Sow early cabbage, carrot, endive, beet, spinach, parsley, roquette, lettuce, radish, mustard, turnip, kohlrabi, parsnip, swiss chard, salisfy.

Set out shallots. Now is the time to sow onion seeds. For general crop sow the creole seeds, as they are the only variety that will keep.

For family use sow the Bermuda and Crystal Wax, they are early and grow to a large size, but will not keep.
