

WARNING THE NEGROES.

No paper has been more persistent and violent for many years than the Chicago Tribune in denunciation of the Southern whites because of the existence of a "race problem" in the South. And now it is the Chicago Tribune which is appealing to the negroes not to force on the Northern whites a similar race problem. Here is a current leading editorial from that paper:

Mr. Edward Morris, the colored member of the constitutional convention, will do the race to which he belongs more good by withdrawing his provision concerning racial equality than by securing its adoption.

The race problem in Illinois is in its infancy. A long course of study and experimentation must take place before the races of different color settle down to a frictionless contact.

Our problem comes from the large migration of colored people from Southern States to the North, where they come into competition and contact with the resident white population. In the cities this contact is crowded and, in the present condition of home shortage, has proven exceedingly irritable, leading to numerous clashes and to terrible race riots. Lastly, by the mobilization of the newly arrived colored population into the ranks of one faction of the Republican party, this faction of the party became dominant, a dominance which was used by Senator Lewis as a campaign argument in the recent election, arousing a great deal of latent racial hostility.

The friction which has arisen since the migration of colored people from the South did not exist between the white and the colored people who resided here formerly. We look hopefully toward the end of the present animosity, to the elimination of existing prejudices and social injustices. Such an end can only come with forbearance and conciliation. The demonstration of an aggressive spirit on the part of the new arrivals to force themselves upon the old population will arouse an active resentment which will result most detrimentally to them.

This is not only an appeal, but it is a warning. Southern negroes must not go to Illinois with the expectation that they can escape the race discrimination which the Tribune has taught them they suffered in the South. They must refrain from claiming on Lake Michigan any of the privileges and rights whose denial on the Gulf has elicited the Tribune's caustic condemnation. Encouraged by the Tribune, they must not migrate to Chicago in the belief that

they can demand the recognition withheld from them in Memphis or Richmond. If they do they now have the assurance of the Tribune itself that they "will arouse an active resentment which will result most detrimentally to them."

And those colored victims of racial passions who have already aroused that "active resentment", and who are not now dead, know that its effects in Illinois are not different from what they are in Alabama or Mississippi.—Louisville Courier-Journal.

So great was the rush of recruits for service in Germany when enlistments were thrown open on November 1 that before telegrams discontinuing acceptances could go out from Major General P. C. Harris, The Adjutant General of the Army, to army recruiting officers throughout the country, twice the number of men desired had enrolled. There were 200 infantry vacancies, and in six hours 250 had enlisted before they could be stopped, 338 had joined. For the 56 vacancies in other branches, 90 men got in under the wire before they could be held up from Washington, a total of 428.

Letters home from soldiers in the American forces in Germany tell a story of pleasant life on the Rhine, with the American dollar worth so many marks that the average private is almost a plutocrat when compared to the Germans. An interesting side light on service there is the fact that a number of discharged men on their way home recently turned back at Antwerp to enlist.—Ex.
