From the reports we hear, he, accompanied by Mr. Paul Broussard and Mr. James Dauterive were riding in a truck on their way home from a hunt in Lake Dauterive and when nearing the property of Mr. Gonsoulin they plunged their truck into a tractor that had been left on the roadside without a light. The truck that the occupants were in was also without a light at the time. The collision was so violent that Mr. Berard was thrown head first against the tractor and suffered such a concussion of the skull that it was thought he would soon expire. Dr. Guy A. Shaw and Dr. J. W. K. Shaw of this City immediately went to his assistance and a number of bones were extracted from his skull. The shock was so violent that he became completely paralyzed. On Thursday evening we learned that he was slightly better and hopes were now entertained that he might possibly recover. This should be a lesson to those who persist in traveling after dark without any lights on their cars as there is no telling when some obstruction is left on a public road and those who travel without the proper headlight take a risk of being killed or injured for life. From what we could ascertain the tractor which was left on the road had gotten out of order and the owner could not go any further with it, which accounts for it being on the roadside.

—Now that our Main Street from the Post Office to the upper limits of New Iberia is well lighted up with a nice White Way would it not be a good idea for some public spirited East Ender to circulate a petition asking the new City Administration to light up East End from the Post Office to the end of the City limits. No better investment could be made by the property holders than to have that section of the City lighted up in conformity with the other section of Main Street. Let everything we do be just a little bit better than the surrounding towns and in that way New Iberia will soon be recognized by the outside world as the most enterprising City in the State.
