—The City Commissioners met last Friday, Mayor La Salle in the chair, Commissioners Broussard and Villermin present. I. W. Gajan was elected City Attorney and Dr. W. F. Carstens, City Health Officer. Mr. Modinger of New Orleans was named for auditor by the local banks. This position was filled by Mr. R. G. Robertson for the past three years.

—Quite a painful accident occurred Sunday afternoon, when Sam Cortez, a twelve-year-old son of Chris Cortez was thrown from a bicycle he and another boy were riding. In some unaccountable manner, Cortez put his foot in the front wheel causing the bicycle to stop and turn over. In the fall, Cortez's arm was broken and dislocated at the elbow.

—Mr. Fred DeBlanc, the Parish Road Foreman is engaged this week repairing the highway between New Iberia and our sister town of Jeanerette. When he finishes blading the road, some twenty cars of gravel will be used filling in the low spots so as to put the highway in perfect condition. In discussing the necessity of keeping up this road with the Secretary of the Jury, Mr. Paul Bassin, he informed us that it is the intention of the Jury to employ a man to fill the ruts with gravel as fast as they occur. This is the correct method and it has been followed by the officials of St. Mary since the stretch of highway was completed between Jeanerette and Morgan City. In fact all of the highways will have to be looked after constantly to keep them from filling with ruts. It is far better, and cheaper to fill in the little ruts when they first occur than await until a highway gets in such shape that several hundred dollars has to be expended bringing it back to its original condition when first completed. Mr. DeBlanc has been doing some efficient work in different parts of the Parish recently.

—On August 1st the Eureka Hotel will be turned over to the new lessee, Mr. A. G. Barrow, who has leased the hotel for a term of years from the owner, Hon. John Emmer. For the past year this hostelry has been conducted under the management of Mr. S. L. Broussard whose lease expires at the end of the present month. Mr. Broussard and his family will remove to New Orleans to engage in the same line of occupation, having leased a commodious building in the Crescent City. In the future the Eureka House and special attention will be given to the traveling public. The interior of the hotel is being completely renovated and it is Mr. Barrow's intention to conduct the hostelry like all first-class hotels in up-to-date cities.

—The pass books of the Iberia Building Association are being called in for the semi-annual audit, and that the dividends for the six months may be credited thereon. Mr. G. A. Modinger, auditor of the Association, was detained in New Orleans, hence the delay in this work. Applications for loans are many.
