THE HIGHWAY BOARD.

Louisiana will, within the next five or six years, expend more money for public highways than any State in the South, or probably the United States.

With the heavy tax on automobiles, trucks and gasoline which was authorized by the members of the Constitutional Convention, several millions of dollars in revenue will be realized which will be materially augmented by another million from the United States government.

The recent special session of the Legislature directed the appointment by Gov. Parker of a commission of three and an engineer, who will control the funds and carry on the gigantic undertaking.

It was not our intention to launch the name of any one for these responsible positions of trust, as we know Governor Parker fully appreciates the responsibility that rests upon his shoulders.

Some days ago, we noticed however, the names of several gentlemen who are spoken of as being in line for the appointments, and taking a cue from the article, we have taken it upon ourselves to urge that South Louisiana be represented on the road commission by Hon. Henry E. Estorge of Opelousas.

Notwithstanding the sum the farmers are receiving for sugar cane in this Parish, which is the lowest in many years, the general impression prevails that the immense yield this season will, in a measure, counterbalance the small price realized and the cane farmers will not incur such losses as was first supposed.

JAPAN WANTS RICE.

The American Rice Growers Association is in receipt of a telegram this morning from a California rice miller advising that fancy Japans had advanced to \$5.25 in double pockets, ship-side San Francisco.

While the export demand is for Japan rice only at this time, this information from California, said Mr. Trotter today, "is very encouraging and leads us to look with optimism on the future market for our Blue Rose rices, as we are advised from European sources that Japan will be compelled to import 500,000 tons of rice, or 10,000,000 pockets, to fill their requirements, and their attention is now being given California Japans.

We have no doubt that most of the California crop will be exported, which means that all domestic markets will be left entirely dependent on the southern crops for their supplies, and these crops are only about equal to our present consumption.

We also know that France wants our Blue Rose rice, preferably in the paddy, or brown, on account of heavy duty on the clean, and if necessary we are going to take steps to furnish them such supplies.

Our advice to farmers is to sit steady and not offer any of their product at present prices.

E. R. Henry, with the American Rice Growers association, stated this morning that Mr. Chalkley, president of the association, is doubtless in Washington by this time in behalf of the proposed \$2,000,000 loan from the war finance corporation, but as yet he has not received any telegram from him.

ACT OF INCORPORATION "The Toggery," Incorporated

State of Louisiana, Parish of Iberia. Be it known that on this 19th day of November in the year of our Lord, One Thousand Nine Hundred and Twenty One, before me, C. Arthur Provost, a Notary Public in and for the Parish and State aforesaid, duly commissioned and qualified as such, and in the presence of the witnesses hereinafter named and undersigned, personally came and appeared the persons whose names are hereunto subscribed, but of whom Henry Broussard and Octave J. Villere are represented by Donald R. Mestayer, by virtue of a Power of Attorney, a certified copy of which is hereunto annexed and made part hereof, who declared that availing themselves of the laws of this State, relative to the organization of corporations and particularly Act No. 267 of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana for the session of 1914, they have covenanted and agreed and do by these presents, covenant and agree to bind, form and constitute themselves as well as such other persons who may hereafter join or become associated with them into a corporation and body politic in law, for the objects and purposes, and under the agreements and stipulations following, to-wit:

ARTICLE I. The name and title of this corporation shall be "THE TOGGERY," INCORPORATED, and as such shall enjoy all the rights and privileges granted by law to corporations, and their term of its existence shall be for a period of Ninety-Nine (99) years.

ARTICLE II. The domicile of said corporation shall be in the City of New Iberia, Parish of Iberia, State of Louisiana, and all citations and all legal process shall be served upon the President and in his absence upon the Secretary-Treasurer of this corporation.

ARTICLE III. The objects and purposes of this corporation and the nature of the business to be carried on by it are hereby declared to be the carrying on of the business as dealers in clothing, shoes, shirts, collars, underwear and all men's furnishing goods; it shall have power to contract, sue and be sued in its corporate name to make and use a corporate seal, to hold, receive, purchase, convey, mortgage or pledge property, both real and personal; to borrow money and issue bonds, notes and other obligations; to have and employ such officers, directors, managers, agents, and other employees as the interest of said corporation may require and to establish such by-laws, rules and regulations for the proper management and control of its affairs as may be necessary and expedient.

ARTICLE IV. The amount of capital stock of this corporation is hereby fixed at the sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars, divided into One Hundred (100) shares, par value One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars each provided, however, that the subscription of Fifty (50 p. c.) per cent of said stock shall be sufficient to charter said corporation; and said stock shall be paid for in cash and may be issued for property actually acquired for by said corporation.

ARTICLE V. It is agreed upon becoming a stockholder of this corporation that in the event said stockholder wishes dispose of his stock, he must first offer it to the existing stockholders of this corporation for a period of Thirty (30) days before disposing of it to outside parties.

ARTICLE VI. Each stockholder shall be entitled, in person or by proxy, to cast one vote for each share of stock owned by him.

ARTICLE VII. No stockholder of this corporation shall ever be liable for the contract or faults of the corporation in any further sum than the amount of the unpaid balance due on his stock; or shall any informality in organization have the effect of rendering this charter null or of exposing a stockholder to any liability beyond the amount due on his stock.

ARTICLE VIII. All the corporate powers of this corporation, and the management and control of its affairs shall be vested in and exercised by the Board of Directors composed of three (3) stockholders, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum in the transaction of business.

The Directors of the said corporation shall be elected annually at a meeting of the stockholders to be held on the Second Monday of May each year at the domicile of the Corporation, and notice of said stockholders meeting for the election of directors must be given to each stockholder at least fifteen (15) days before the day of such meeting by depositing said notice in the Post Office properly addressed to each stockholder; such notice to be signed by the Secretary.

ARTICLE IX. All vacancies on the Board of Directors of said Corporation shall be filled by election by a majority vote of the other members of the Board of Directors for the unexpired term.

ARTICLE X. The office of President-Manager and Secretary-Treasurer or all of them may be held by the same person provided said person be a stockholder at the time of said election and shall hold at the time not less than one share of unpledged stock in said corporation; the Board of Directors to appoint or elect said officers.

ARTICLE XI. The Board of Directors to manage the business and affairs of this corporation from date of incorporation qualified is declared to be as follows: Henry Broussard, New Orleans, La. who shall be President-Manager; Donald R. Mestayer, New Orleans, La. who shall be Secretary-Treasurer and Octave J. Villere, New Orleans, La., who shall be Vice-President.

ARTICLE XII. The failure to elect Directors on the Second Monday of May annually shall not dissolve the corporate or impair its management, but the then existing directors and officers shall hold over until the next annual election, except as otherwise provided herein.

ARTICLE XIII. The Board of Directors shall have the power to adopt, establish, amend and alter such by-laws, rules and regulations as it may deem necessary for the proper conduct and management of the business of the corporation. It may appoint all such officers, agents, or employees as may be necessary and shall have power to define and fix the duty of said officers or employees, who shall hold office and employment at the pleasure of the board.

ARTICLE XIV. Whenever this corporation shall be dissolved, either by liquidation or otherwise, its affairs shall be liquidated by two commissioners to be appointed by the stockholders at a meeting called for that purpose. Said Commissioners shall remain in office until the affairs of said corporation shall have been fully liquidated, and in the event of the death of one of said Commissioners, the survivor shall complete the liquidation.

ARTICLE XV. The names and post office addresses of the subscribers of these articles of incorporation and a statement of the number of shares which each agrees to take, and the marital status of each of said incorporators appear by the signatures of said subscribers. Thus done and passed in my office in the City of New Iberia, Louisiana in the presence of Messrs. A. Mouhot and Mr. E. Vuillemot, good and competent witnesses, residing in this Parish who, after due reading of the whole hereunto signed their names together with the appearers and me, Notary, on the day and date above specified.
