

AMERICAN EDUCATION WEEK DEC. 4th to 10th.

Under the auspices of the American Legion and The National Education Association, December 4th to 10th, 1921 has been set aside as American Education Week.

This movement was made possible by the American Legion through its Americanism Commission, which asked and received the co-operation of the National Education Association; the latter organization accepting the invitation in the following resolution (in part):

"The National Education Association welcomes most heartily and accepts with great appreciation the offer of the American Legion to co-operate with the National Education Association in securing for America a program of education adequate to meet the needs of the twentieth century and which will give every boy and every girl that equipment in education and training which is his right under our democratic government and which will make of all, whether native or foreign born, good American citizens."

The resolution continues in words that exhort the American people to see to it that teachers in our schools are American citizens who have taken the oath of allegiance to the government; that these teachers should only be allowed to teach after they have successfully completed a standard high school education of four years with two additional years of professional training; that adequate instruction be required in American History and Civics, both in elementary and high schools that patriotic exercises be conducted regularly in all schools; that an educational week should be observed in all communities annually for the purpose of informing the

public of the accomplishments and needs of the public schools, and to secure the co-operation and support of the public in meeting these needs.

The American Legion stands ready to do its part in showing the way in patriotism and education—it stands for service to community, state, and nation; it will ever lend its efforts to the end that Americans will "Understand, Know and Love America," and realizing that this can be accomplished principally through education, it will, therefore, work for the improvement of the law to the end that education may become the privilege of all the people.

Therefore, let us realize that ignorance is America's most formidable foe, and education, our mightiest ally; that the nation will never be safe until it sincerely interests itself in the cause of education for citizenship—the community, the state and the nation must join hands in education for citizenship.

"BAB" COMING MONDAY.

An amusing arrangement of the Rinehart stories under the title of "Bab" will be presented at the Elks Theatre, Monday, December 5th, the title character reintroducing the winsome little actress, Helen Weir, in a new style of personation and one particularly adapted to her dramatic abilities. All the action is centered about the strange little combination of woman and child whose peculiar trend of ideas and thoughts involve so many persons in misunderstandings and difficulties serious as well as comical.

"Bab" is so largely a one-part comedy that all other roles are scarcely more than suggestions of a sufficient variety of types to fill out certain demands for an entertainment of the required length.

Returning home from boarding unannounced Bab bursts upon the family just before her sister Leila's coming out party, to the evident discomfiture of the debutante and Mrs. Archibald.

Immediately trouble begins to brew and among other things there is the fear that the unwelcome one may interfere with the full success of the sister's reception.

It so happens that Bab has met Clinton Beresford, the wished-for suitor for Leila's hand, the fact being revealed by a mix-up of suit-casts, his calling at the Archibald mansion and a confession by both parties.

Pretty soon Bab "invents" a sweetheart of her own. This is unfortunate as her own true love, Carter Brooks, recognizes a friend in the picture Bab has of the man.

Aided by father Archibald, young Brooks introduces the original of the photograph, and in her endeavors to avoid accepting this friend the little girl passes through oceans of "tortures." Finally she arranges an elopement for Leila and Clinton and presumably outlines a consummation of "love's young dream" for herself and Brooks. The intricacies of the story are slight but many. About every time Baz has a few lines to speak an incident bobs up; so she is in seeming hot water all the time.

The role is permeated with bright and queer expressions, odd deductions and topsy-turvy philosophy and quotations delivered by the lovable little artist in the most infectious manner. Practically every line is a laugh, and as Miss Weir is on the stage the greater part of the time the resultant amusement is considerable.

Face, figure and voice suit to a dot the requirements of the role of the 17th year old girl, her manner, poise, sudden twists and turns in action being cleverly and fittingly associated with the physical requirements. It is one of the most charming bits of light and joyous comedy work seen in this city.

POISONED WATERS.

The pollution of Bayou Teche and the navigation canal in the rear of Franklin, by the sugar refineries is a positive disgrace. No other section of the country would tolerate such a situation. There are factories all over the United States, which use acids; but they are not allowed to discharge them into the public waters. The stench this year, arising from them is unbearable, owing to the long drought, which has held the same waters in the streams since the mills started.

The surfaces of Bayou Teche and the canal are covered with dead fish; the water is unserviceable to the people living along the Teche, for their cattle—many of whom have not a sufficient tank supply, and no wells. Every winter the sugar factories actually take Bayou Teche and the navigation canal as their own. Even the private homes are stench-ridden, that have to use this putrid slime for flush water from the city water mains. Those who also use it for the bath, however, have long since ceased to do so for this year, and cannot resume its use until about April of next year.

The masses of people do not know that the sugar factories can be compelled by the law, to dispose of their poisoned waters some other way. They do

not know there are several scientific processes used for the disposition of waters under the same situation. The sugar factories simply have refused to go to the little expense necessary to keep the discharge from their mills upon their own premises.

If a little salt water happens to be found in the Teche water, a great stir is made over it, because of the possibility of its coming from the Gulf through the Hanson canal, and analysis of the canal water must be quickly made, and that most ridiculous thing we call the United States War Department has to be consulted right away, on the complaint of these very sugar factories that pour thousands of yards of their daily slime into the streams the entire grinding season.

The gates of the Hanson canal have been closed, constantly, on the order of War Department, we have been told, because of the bare risk that some small portion of salt water might get into the sacred Teche, and prevent the boilers of the sugar factories from steaming properly. But this salt water would not hurt anybody except the sugar factory owner, who is so extremely jealous of his rights when the Hanson canal is thought to threaten an interference.

But that branch of the government we have called the War Department, knows that

Bayou Teche has been poisoned every year for the last fifty years. It knows that the stream's service to the people who live along it has been destroyed every year of that time, during the winter season; it knows that the destruction of the fish life in the stream by that means has caused a loss to the common people of thousands of dollars. But it has never made a move to prevent it. Major Dent should either govern the public waters within his jurisdiction or resign his office. We do not intimate that any successor would be likely to enforce the law, unless he was strong enough to the independent of the influence that the sugar factories seem to have yielded over every other engineer who has preceded him in that office.—Weekly Watchman.


