The N. O. Picayune has the following to say about these gentlemen:

Hon. W. A. Porter of West Feliciana, was not very conspicuous during the session, not having any pet measures to push. He served on a number of committees, though, and voted with the Democrats on all measures. Senator S. McC. Lawrason, of West Feliciana, had many claims to distinction. He was considered the handsomest man in the senate, and also one of the ablest. He was chairman of the caucus committee which drew up the constitution bills, and his advice guided the committee to a great extent in its work. He also took a prominent part in the investigation of the State University, and as one of the members of the Board of Supervisors of that Institution, defeated

Colonel Nicholson. He is not a man of many words, being able to explain anything which he undertakes very concisely and effectively. He succeeded in getting five bills into the house, but two of them were indefinitely postponed while the other three went through, and received the governor's signature. Two of these bills were in reference to making maps of municipalities, and the other was to provide for the taking of testimony in criminal cases. He was chairman of the committee on municipalities and corporations. Judge Lawrason is a brother of Dr. Lawrason of this city.


