We clip from the N. O. Picayune a full account of the wedding of Miss Pauline Freyhan, eldest daughter of J. Freyhan, knowing it will be interesting to her many friends in this her native place.

The Freyhan-Odenheimer wedding which took place on Wednesday, Jan. 19, 1898, was quite unique, the ceremony at the Temple Sinai being a brilliant assembly, the reception following at the Harmony Club being the first of its kind ever held in the magnificent building on St. Charles and Jackson avenues. The best man, Mr. Sam Friedman, awaited the coming of the bridal party at the altar rail. The bride, who is a lovely young brunette, looked regal in her magnificent bridal robes of dachese satin trimmed in chiffon and point d'Alencon; the yoke and sleeves were of shirred chiffon outlined with a bertha of rare and magnificent lace, which fell in graceful festoons to the hem of the skirt in front. The long tulle veil was held in place with a small spray of orange blossoms caught with a pearl sunburst.
