The Short Sun Fish.

The short sun fish is of a most singular shape, looking as if three-fourths of a very large fish had been cut off leaving only the head and shoulders.

It attains to a very large size and has been known to weigh three hundred pounds, its length being only four feet five inches.

It lives mostly at the bottom of the sea, but frequently rises to the surface, and lies, perhaps, asleep, floating with the tide. Sailors in this case are fond of trying their skill with a harpoon. When struck it uses very powerful but exceedingly awkward efforts to escape.

The Limpets.

The limpets are spread over every latitude, except the Arctic regions. The common limpet is to be found on every rock and large stone at the seaside. The mode of its attachment to the rock is very curious and will repay a careful examination. Every one who has seen a living limpet knows how firmly it fixes itself to the rock. This is done by the inhabitant creating a vacuum on the under surface of its body, which causes the pressure of the atmosphere to keep it so tightly fixed to the rocks that a blade of a strong knife is required to detach it. Frequently the margin of the shell adapts itself to the shape of the substance to which it adheres, proving that it must remain fixed in the same spot for a long time, and rendering it difficult to imagine from whence it can obtain sufficient nourishment to support life. Sometimes a large shell may be picked up covered with limpets that adhere firmly to it in spite of the rolling of the waves and the tossing about to which it must necessarily be subjected.

The Popular Pippin.

There is no more delightful fruit for general use than the apple, and yet those who have lived in cities the past winter have been obliged to pay rather a large price for this desired food. It has been difficult even to procure two fair apples for five cents, and many good toothsome ones have sold for a nickel apiece. This scarcity of a popular fruit has been much deplored, for its use is sometimes better than medicine. But the apple crop while a failure in many parts of the country last year was not wholly so. In the Old Dominion, as Virginia is called, there is an even climate that gives fruits a very good chance. In 1897 there was one farm on which the apple crop sold for \$15,000 and another on which it brought \$14,000. The apples in these orchards were principally of the variety known as the Newtown pippin, and there were buyers, Englishmen searching eagerly for this one fruit, which they wanted for export. Why, many persons will ask, should they have been so anxious to obtain Newtown pippins when there are other apples just as good to look at and as pleasant to the taste? It is due to the fact that these are the special kind that several years ago pleased Queen Victoria. Immediately the whole British nation called for the same article, and from that day to this it has been considered the choicest in existence. It is an apple "to the queen's taste." Virginia was lucky because it happened to be planted widely in Virginia.

How the Century Plant Got Its Name.

About two centuries ago a Russian nobleman traveling in Mexico saw and admired the magney plant, which is a native of Mexico. The plant was so much admired by the Russian for its beauty and utility that he was eager to have growing specimens in his own country. So, when leaving Mexico, he procured some roots to take home to the czar as a present.

On his first visit to court, after he reached the capital city, he told of the wonderful plant and asked permission of the czar to present to him the specimens which he had. The czar graciously granted his request and gave the roots to the court gardener, who promised to give the plants his best attention; but, unfortunately, before he could plant them properly, as he intended, he was taken suddenly ill, and died without having accomplished anything.

Another gardener was appointed. In the meantime the roots lay in the sack in which they were placed. The new gardener, not knowing their value, threw the sack away, and it lay unheeded in a corner of the garden day after day. Some time afterward his little daughter picked up one of the roots, and in a playful mood, planted it, but paid it no further attention. The czar had forgotten all about it. In course of time the ruler died and also the second gardener.

The plant in after years put out a few spikes for leaves, but did not thrive in the cold air of Russia. It grew very slowly and its origin was not known to anyone save the wife of the former gardener and the child that planted it.

Years passed and still the strange plant with its thick, long, straight leaves, now nearly six feet tall, did not bloom, but as it grew taller it attracted notice, and the new czar sometimes looked at it and wondered if it would ever bloom.

In time he, too, died, and still the magney bloomed not. But just after the coronation of another czar a stalk shot up from the root of the plant and rapidly grew to the height of twenty feet. Soon many clusters of small buds appeared which slowly unfolded and became white blossoms. The wonderful plant had bloomed at last!

The gardener said it was 100 years old and had bloomed in honor of the new czar. Word was sent to him and he and his whole court visited and admired the flowers and the plant.

The poor exile from the sunny skies of Mexico had earned its reward and a new name, for ever since that day it has been known as "the century plant."—Mary E. Muncey, in Godey's Magazine.

Lambs Playing Soldier.

Looking out of my study window one quiet afternoon, my attention was drawn to a flock of sheep and lambs quietly resting and chewing their cuds. Presently a large, spirited lamb walked out a few paces in front of the flock, pranced about awhile as if to show its agility, then took a position facing the flock and gave a peculiar bleating which his soldiers all seemed to understand, for they left the flock and gathered around their captain.

Captain Lamb looked seriously at the tree for a few minutes, then sprang forward and ran up the trunk of the tree until he came to some limbs, then balanced himself and jumped off. Then he went back to the head of the column and seemed to give orders to the head of the company to follow suit. The one at the head of the column went through the same performance, and each one took his turn until the whole company had been through the maneuver. The same fellow that the captain had to discipline broke ranks again and tried to be in ahead, but the captain butted him again until he took his place in the ranks, which seemed to settle him for the rest of the performance.

All of the lambs ran up the trunk of the tree about as far as the captain had, except one timid fellow, who only went about half way, and in trying to turn around lost his balance, fell to the ground and then went to the rear of the column, as if he were ashamed of his performance. I noticed, too, that the same fellow which the captain had twice punished for insubordination tried to outdo all the rest by running up the trunk of the tree a little further than the rest, but he came to grief again by falling off instead of jumping as the others had.

When they went through this performance the captain got them into line again at a right angle with the trunk of the tree where it was about two feet from the ground, and placing himself at the head of the column, ran forward and jumped over the tree trunk, all the rest forming except the timid one, who seemed to mortified at his first failure to risk another.

This ended the regular performance and away they went up the hill, butting and jumping over one another with no more order than a lot of boys let out of school. They were soon scattered among the flock, which had been watching their performance with deep interest.—M. S. Hall, in Chicago Record.
