Capdevielle and Franz; L. Z. Crawford, surveyor of the parish of Caddo, and several notaries public.

Tuesday.—The house met at noon with 78 members present. The ways and means committee reported favorably on the Trezevant bill, compelling parishes to pay to the state one half of licenses imposed for the sale of liquors. Notices of bills were given, and one or two important measures were introduced.

Wednesday.—The house met at noon with John Marks of Assumption in the chair. The desk of the late representative Peyton was draped with crepe and covered with flowers. Friday was set apart as a day for memorial services. Messrs. Caldwell, of Natchitoches, Roth, Foster, Williams, Hyams and Dupre were appointed as committee on resolutions.

Thursday.—The house met at 10:30 o'clock with eighty-four members present. Mr. Foster presented a resolution inviting Mr. D. A. Tompkin, of Charlotte, N. C., to address the house on the subject of textile schools on what-ever day may be convenient to him.
