Examinations for Peabody Scholarship.

Competitors for Louisiana scholarships in the Peabody Normal College at Nashville, Tennessee, are instructed to file their application with the State Superintendent of Public Instruction at Baton Rouge on or before July 12th instant. Four vacancies are to be filled. The qualifications required for a scholarship are as follows:

The applicant must be a resident of Louisiana, of not less than seven years of age, nor more than thirty, of irreproachable moral character, in good health, with no physical defects, eccentricities, or habits which would interfere with success in teaching; and must make a pledge of intent to teach for at least two years after graduation.

The names of the supervisors of the examinations, and the places where these are to be held, will be made known as all the applications are filed. The dates fixed by the Normal College are the 10th and 20th of the present month.
