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IDOL OF THE FRENCH

KRUEGER'S PROGRESS NORTH A CONTINUOUS OVATION.

Friendless Scenes of Enthusiasm Along the Route—Enthusiastic Admirers Cheer Themselves Hoarse—Krueger is Now in Paris.

Dijon, France.—Mr. Krueger has become for a moment, at least, the popular idol of the French. His triumphant march northward through the country from Marseilles to Dijon has settled this beyond doubt. He met with a tremendous reception in each town along the route where the train stopped, culminating in scenes of frenzied enthusiasm calculated to turn the head of any man.

The population of Marseilles gathered in thousands to escort him to the railroad station and gave him a rousing send-off, while at Tarascon, Avignon, Valence, Lyons, Marseilles and Dijon the inhabitants who crowded the railroad station made the rafters tremble with enthusiastic shouts of "Vive Krueger" and "Vive les Boers." The demonstration was the more significant because it shows that the fervid acclamations at Marseilles were not merely an explosion of exuberance on the part of the warmhearted and excited populace of a sunny clime, but sentiments shared with even greater intensity by the usually less demonstrative and colder blooded inhabitants of the northern provinces. The warmth of the enthusiasm increased instead of decreasing.

One of the most important phases of the demonstration was the turn it took in an anti-British direction. The Englishmen whose ill timed money throwing at the hotel Du Louvre in Marseilles exasperated the people in the streets there, never dreamed of the serious consequences of their actions. They sowed the wind and the English reaped the whirlwind. The news of the supposed insult to Krueger seems to have spread across France and at all stations, but especially at Lyons and Dijon shouts for the Boers were mingled with loud cries of "Down with the English." Indeed at Lyons the

DENUNCIATION OF THE ENGLISH drowned the shouting for the Boers. This is a disturbing feature which is universally discussed. Fears are expressed that the reception in Paris may assume a character calculated to arouse the feeling of Great Britain against France to such an extent as to result in unpleasant relations between the two countries.

The warmth of enthusiasm reached in Marseilles palpably raised the spirits of Mr. Krueger and his advisers to a high pitch. Mr. Krueger arrived in Paris and was given a magnificent reception. The boulevards were crammed with vast crowds.

Mr. Krueger and party entered the train at Dijon and the train only stopped once en route, where a deputation with flags was waiting at the station for Mr. Krueger with a warmly worded address of admiration and sympathy for the Boer cause.

Elsewhere along the route there were the same scenes. A London dispatch says: There are rumors that an attempt will be made to assassinate Krueger. Information has been conveyed to the authorities of an alleged plan to be executed at Paris at the banquet. Krueger's friends have been notified to be watchful.

Under Military Guard, Hempstead, Texas.—The saw rifles have arrived here from Navasota under orders from the Governor. The examination trial of J. N. Gallon, E. C. Umland, Henry Sanders, John Seber, Sr. and John Seber has been held before Justice B. C. Lewis of Waller. The trial is likely to consume several days. The accused are charged with the killing of Dan Cabsen near Waller and it was feared that there would be further trouble over the matter. The dead officers' friends are disposed to take up the fight.

Key Line Tied up. Key West, Fla.—The entire street railway system of Key West is completely and indefinitely tied up by the cigarmakers' strike. All of the cars have been run to the sheds and locked up.

Unsuccessful Bank Robbery. Nashville, Tenn.—A special to the Banner from Elizabethton, Tenn., says: An unsuccessful attempt was made to rob the People's bank of this place. The would-be robbers forced open the door in the main entrance of the building, and made their way to the vault, but apparently they were fearful of discovery and made but little effort to get into the safe.

RETRIBUTORY MEASURES.

Unless Turkey Quickly Comes to Terms Relative to Consulate.

Washington.—The Turkish authorities having refused to grant an exequatur to Dr. Thomas H. Norton to act as United States consul at Harpoot, the indications point to some retaliatory measures on the part of our government in the near future. The Turkish contention now is that they permitted a United States consulate to be established at Esmeroun under an implied understanding that the United States would abandon its claim to a consulate at Harpoot. That there was some such shadow of foundation for this understanding is admitted, but it is still the purpose of the United States to establish this consulate and the British government has since been permitted to locate a consul at Harpoot and, under the favored nation clause of our treaty with Turkey, the United States government claims the same commercial privileges as Great Britain.

WAR IS AGAIN ON.

Arbuckles and the Sugar Trust Lock Horns Once More.

New York.—There is some indication that the conflict in coffee is merely the initial one of the series. The Sugar Trust people claim to be expecting further declines in raw coffee, in which case package coffee will be promptly received.

At the office of the Arbuckles it was stated that the reduction in sugar had been made upon its own basis, and was not connected with the decline in coffee. "The reason why we made a cut of 15 points," said a representative of the firm, "is because others have been cutting secretly 10 points, especially in the west, and we decided to go them 5 better—openly, as we always do our business. This does not look like harmony. There is no harmony. At 5.45c, the gross price for granulated, there is no profit in refining, but a loss. If we could get raw at 4.38c, the present price, then there would be a profit. But the sugar we are now working of cost us 4.5-8c."

BRYAN, TOWNE AND DUBOIS

Confer in Chicago—W. J. in Politics to Stay.

Chicago.—William Jennings Bryan arrived in Chicago this morning from Lincoln. He drove to the Auditorium Annex where he did not register, but was shown to the room occupied by Charles A. Towne, of Minnesota. There he remained in consultation with Mr. Towne and former Senator Fred T. Dubois, or Idaho, until tonight, when he returned to Lincoln. Mr. Bryan refused to say what was discussed during the meeting, but did not deny that the future policy of the Democratic party was one of the topics discussed. "I expect to remain in politics as long as I live," said Mr. Bryan. "I shall continue to advocate and work with both tongue and pen for the principles for which I have fought so long. I shall continue to reside in Lincoln, Neb."

STEAMER ST. OALIFF

Wrecked And all on Board Were Probably Lost.

Buffalo, N. Y.—A special to the News from Quebec says: A special from Seven Islands, Northshore, reports the complete wreck of the steamer St. Oaliff, Capt. Le Maistre, of Quebec. It is supposed all on board were lost. Only one body, that of a woman, with a mail bag and some other articles, so far, has been recovered.

Seven Islands is on the north shore of the gulf of St. Lawrence, about 300 miles below Quebec.

Submarine Boat to Replace the Plunger.

Washington.—The navy department entered into a contract with the Holland Submarine Boat Company for the construction of a boat of the type of the six heretofore contracted for, to replace the plunger, the company agreeing to take the plunger off the hands of the government and to build in her place the best type of modern submarine boat for \$170,000, refunding to the government \$94,000 already paid on the plunger.

W. O. Bowden Reappears.

Columbus, Ga.—W. O. Bowden, who resides near here, has returned to his home. He disappeared while in bathing at Tybee island last summer and no trace of him was known. He says he has been ill in Richmond, Va. It is said an effort was made to collect between \$20,000 and \$30,000 life insurance, but no part of it was paid by the companies.
