

Heroes of West Feliciana.

R. J. Thom.

ONE IS reminded of the Scriptural quotation "At evening time it shall be light" in looking at the bright, cheerful countenance of the veteran R. J. Thom. The reward of a good conscience comes to him "For he looks the whole world in the face," having lived an upright, honorable life, in the place and calling which Providence has provided.

way without a final s which so many of his family adopt. R. J. Thom comes from a race of soldiers. His grandfather, Alexander Thom, as a young man fought at Culloden, that heroic fight of Scotchmen for the Young Pretender. His father, James Alexander Thom, born in 1773 by Alexander Thom's third wife, fought in the war of 1812, and was with Jackson at the glorious battle of New Orleans.

To Robert James Thom himself

fell the lot, like his grandfather of fighting for a Lost Cause, and a gallant fight it was, distinguished as it was by determination and pluck to stick to duty in spite of ill health and violent attacks of illness. In June, 1861, he joined the Rosale Guards, a company raised in this parish and a part of the 11th Louisiana Infantry. He was in the battle of Belmont, in which his company lost heavily. He was discharged on account of bad health, but joined the army again at Port Hudson. He would have been in the siege but failed of admittance. He returned home to take care of his invalid mother.

His fight was a personal one, against bodily illness, and he deserves credit for his efforts to serve his country against such odds.

"Not failure but low aim is crime," and R. J. Thom has all ways had high aims and honorable motives.

He was born Aug. 12, 1837, the twentieth of twenty-one children and lives on the same piece of land on which he was born, an inheritance from his mother. There he has lived a useful life, farming, and attending to the duties of a Christian and a citizen. He has been a trustee of New Hope Methodist church for forty years. He lost his wife, Catherine Campbell, many years ago, but in his dutiful children, Misses Annie and Janet and Messrs. Robert J., Howard W. and Palmer S. Thom, he finds the consolations of family life, having always the higher hopes of the Christian, that sees in earthly existence but a preparation for Eternity.

High School Opens.

Julius Freyhan High School opened Monday with 156 pupils present, the largest attendance ever seen here at an opening day. By Christmas, it is confidently expected that there will be an enrollment of 200.
