New Schedule on L. R. & N.

Beginning on Sunday, June 20, a new passenger schedule will go into effect on the L. R. & N. A train will leave Shreveport at night, passing Bayou Sara at 4:30 a. m., and reaching New Orleans at 8:30 a. m. Returning, the train will leave New Orleans at 6:20 p. m., reaching Bayou Sara at 10:20, and Shreveport, early the next morning.

The present daily train will be discontinued north of Baton Rouge, and will run between New Orleans on about the same schedule as at present.

Ordinarily, the new train would be hailed with delight by the citizens of West Feliciana, as it cuts down the running time between Bayou Sara and New Orleans, and allows passengers a stay of nearly four hours longer in the city; but with the annulment of the northbound morning train and the southbound afternoon train we are in no better shape than we were in before the L. R. & N. ran through Bayou Sara, as the Y. & M. V. gives us a morning train into and an evening train out of New Orleans.

Bayou Sara needs a morning train from New Orleans, and needs it badly. If the L. R. & N. persists in its present intention of abandoning this train north of Baton Rouge, our citizens will have to wait for the Y. & M. V. 2:30 p. m. train for mail and the morning papers. During the busy season this train is usually from one to two hours late.

It is rumored that the L. R. & N. will put on a mixed train out of Baton Rouge in the evening and Angola in the morning, but this would not help Bayou Sara any, although it might be of slight convenience to the people between Bayou Sara and Angola, but not enough to compensate for the loss of the train running on the present schedule.

We hope the railroad officials will give this matter further consideration and will make the deserved concession of running the present morning train to Angola, at least.

A few guests were entertained at Belmont Sunday, in honor of Mr. C. M. Barrow's birthday. Mr. Barrow says it was his 25th, but Mr. James P. Bowman, one of the guests, knew better, as he was at Rosale the day of the arrival, and it was some years previous to that.

Bartless and His Boat.
