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

DISCUSSES THE GOOD ROADS QUESTION

Editors True Democrat:

An effort is being made to have the people take up the matter of a road system for our parish.

We have had some little experience with the establishing of road systems, likewise in the matter of bond issues. For a bond issue is inevitable if the roads are to be built and repaired by the parish. And said experience is calculated to cause the people to view with suspicion, all propositions of like character.

It is taken for granted that the road plans and agitation is in line with the sudden passion for trucking, as truckers must have good roads.

It is not the purpose of the writer to endeavor to throw obstacles in the path of progress, but simply to call attention to a few facts in connection with road building, trucking, and bond issues.

First. We now owe a debt of \$20,000 or more, saddled on us through experiments at road building, bridge building and court house building.

Second. We are now at the limit of parish taxation.

Third. State taxation has increased from 5½ mills to 6½ mills and is likely to be 7½ mills next year.

Fourth. As far as known no provision has been made for the payment of the \$20,000 now due.

The old game of employing eleven men to do what three could do, and do better, still goes on. As far as known there is no desire for a change. The desire seems to be to make a few more debts by further experiments with road building bond issues, etc.

It would seem that what is needed most at present is reform in our system of parish government, and retrenchment in public expenditures, with a view to lowering the rate of parish taxation, and paying off the debts now due.

This cannot be done if bonds are issued and more debts made. Bonds mean interest and partial payments, or sinking funds. And this means taxes, and more taxes.

Under the present system, the roads do not present the appearance of turnpikes. But they are in charge of and are worked by the people who have to pass over them. If they are not satisfied with their condition the remedy is in their own hands. A little more elbow grease and mule team will correct the evil.

As for those connected with the trucking associations, they can supplement the work done under the present system with but little cost, and have the kind of road wanted for their business.

Under the most favorable conditions, but a small portion of our people can go into the trucking business, and it would be very unjust to tax the whole people for their benefit. Especially while we are struggling under the burden of a big debt, and an antiquated, cumbersome and expensive local government.
