AN ORDINANCE.

An ordinance to levy, collect and enforce payment of an annual license tax upon all persons, associations of persons, or business firms and corporations, pursuing any trade, profession, vocation, calling or business in the Parish of West Feliciana, Louisiana except those that are expressly excepted from such license tax by Article 229 of the Constitution of the State of Louisiana:

Be it ordained by the Police Jury of the Parish of West Feliciana in regular sessions convened on this 6th day of November, Nineteen hundred and twelve (1912):

Section 1. That there is hereby levied an annual license tax for the year (1913) Nineteen hundred and thirteen, upon each person, associations of persons, or business firms and corporations pursuing any trade, profession, vocation, calling or business, conducted, pursued, carried on or operated within the limits of the Parish of West Feliciana, La., which may be subject to such license tax under Article 229 of the Constitution of the State of Louisiana.

Sec. 2. That on the 2nd day of January, 1913, the tax collector shall begin to collect and shall collect as fast as possible from each of the persons or business firms, associations of persons, and corporations pursuing within the limits of said Parish any trade, profession, calling, vocation or business, a license tax as herein provided. All licenses shall be due and collectible during the first two months of the year 1913 and all unpaid licenses shall become delinquent on the first day of March of said year, and all firms who commence business after that date shall become delinquent unless the license is paid within ten days.

Sec. 3. That the annual parochial license hereby levied is declared to be the same as, and to be graduated in accordance with, the Constitution and laws of the State of Louisiana now in force, and is hereby declared to be the same as to graduation, and in amount as the license laws of the State of Louisiana now in force provide for State purposes, and are to be determined in accordance therewith, to-wit: Act No. 171 of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana of the session of 1898, and the subsequent acts of the General Assembly of Louisiana amendatory thereof. It is hereby declared to be the intention of this body to herein levy the same license tax for parochial purposes, both as to graduation and amount as is now imposed by the General Assembly for State purposes, to which laws special reference is hereby made as being part hereof for the purpose aforesaid; provided that this restriction shall not apply to dealers in distilled alcoholic and malt liquors, the license for the carrying on of which business shall be as hereinafter provided in this ordinance.

Sec. 4. That the procedure in the collection of parochial licenses herein levied, and that to ascertain the amount due for same by the tax collector, shall be the same as is now provided by law for State purposes, and particularly in Act No. 171 of

the General Assembly of Louisiana of the session of 1898, as amended by subsequent acts of the said General Assembly and at subsequent sessions; and the penalties imposed upon, and interest and costs to be collected from delinquents, are declared to be the same and to be collected in the same manner as provided by said act of the General Assembly (as amended by subsequent acts) for State purposes.

Sec. 5. That for every business or dealer in distilled, alcoholic or malt liquors, whether selling by wholesale or retail, the parochial license is hereby levied, graduated and determined as follows, in this Parish: When the gross annual receipts of said business are Fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) or more, the license shall be One thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500) per year, or for any part thereof.

When the gross annual receipts of said business are Thirty-seven thousand dollars (\$37,000) and less than Fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) the license shall be One thousand four hundred dollars (\$1,400) per year or for any part thereof.

When the gross annual receipts of said business are Twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) or more, and less than Thirty-seven thousand dollars (\$37,000) the license shall be Thirteen hundred dollars (\$1,300) per year or for any part thereof.

When the gross annual receipts of said business are less than Twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) the license shall be One thousand dollars (\$1,000) per year, or for any part thereof.

Section 6. That the annual license tax for parochial purposes, on the sale of pistols, or pistol cartridges, and rifles or rifle cartridges, blank pistols and blank cartridges hereby levied, shall be the same as to graduation and amount as now provided for State purposes by Act No. 65 of the regular session of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana of the year 1904, to which act special reference is hereby made for the purpose aforesaid and for identification herewith; and said license shall be collected by the tax collector in the same manner and at the same time as are collected other license taxes.

Section 7. That any person, firm, corporation or company having more than one place of business in said parish, shall pay a separate license for each place of business in said parish.

Section 8. That incorporated municipalities exempt by the Constitution and laws of this State, particularly under Act No. 142 of the General Assembly of the session of 1904 of the State of Louisiana, situated in this parish, are hereby declared to be exempt from the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 9. That the parochial licenses which are herein levied are declared to be for the purposes which may be required by the Constitution and laws of this State, for parochial purposes.

A PETITION

Presented to the Police Jury at its Last Regular Meeting.

The following petition was received and, on motion duly seconded, it was ordered that an election be held on Tuesday, Dec. 10, 1912. The President of the Police Jury authorized to appoint election officers, same to serve free of charge. The said petition to appear for 30 days in True Democrat:

To the Hon. Police Jury for the Parish of West Feliciana:—

We, the undersigned citizens and tax payers respectfully ask that you create a Road District composed of the second ward of said parish, to be known as Road District No. 1; that you order an election to be held on a legal date to vote a 3-mill tax for a period of 5 years, also a tax of 1 dollar on each person in said district who is now or may become subject to work on public roads under the common road law. Also ordain that at said election three commissioners shall be elected in said district who shall have full control of all public roads in this district and of all road funds; that you enact such other ordinances as you may deem wise for the collection of such tax. These said road commissioners shall serve for four years and shall receive for actual service not exceeding \$2 per day and not exceeding \$10 in any one year. The said office of commissioner shall become vacant instantly upon his refusing to serve on any occasion when his services are required for the good of the road.

All ordinances shall be subject to change or amendment by request of commissioners.

These commissioners shall be required to keep an exact account of all money expended on roads and render account to police jury quarterly. The said office shall be filled by the tax payers of the district.

Those favoring this petition mark X in first space; those favoring 5-mill ordinance mark X in second space; those favoring present system mark X in third place; those who have no preference mark X in fourth space.

POOR BRANCH LINE SERVICE.

George J. Reiley in Times-Democrat: It was my ill fortune a few days ago to make a trip from Clinton, La., to Baton Rouge, a distance of thirty-two miles, on one of the Yazoo and Mississippi Valley trains, of which the officials boast of giving the town good service. We left Clinton at the regular hour; viz.: 11:20 a. m., and arrived in Baton Rouge that night at 11 p. m., and had it not been for the sixteen-hour law, which prohibits the working of railroad crews over sixteen hours I do not believe we would have reached Baton Rouge before daylight the next day.

Again, I left Baton Rouge on the same train, which is known as the Clinton local No. 6, at 7:40 a. m.; we should have reached Clinton at 10:30, but reached this place at 12 m., so late that no switching could be done, as the train is scheduled to leave Clinton at 11:20 a. m. Again, 'the shippers of lumber, seed, etc., were disappointed by not having cars placed and had the expense of loading doubled, as the crews have to be kept under pay in order to hold them. From what I saw, the entire trouble is expecting this train to do much more work than is possible. As the season for harvesting the cane crop is at hand, and as there are large quantities being shipped on this line, between Baton Rouge and Ethel, it requires all of the time allotted to this train to handle the cane situation. All else must go undone or extra time given, which is delightful for the passengers. May I ask, if from 11:20 a. m. to 11 p. m., and from 7:40 a. m. to 12 noon for passengers to travel a distance of thirty-two miles is good service, and should not the people of Clinton rejoice over the fact that we are soon to have another road and should put forth every effort to secure same as speedily as possible?
