DEATH OF T. W. PERKINS.

It is with genuine sorrow that we are called on to chronicle the death of Mr. Thos. W. Perkins, a prominent and popular citizen of the southern portion of our county, who died in New Orleans on last Friday morning at three o'clock at the Presbyterian Hospital, where he had gone for treatment. He had been suffering for sometime past with some trouble which affected his head and about two weeks ago he went to New Orleans to consult a physician with the hope of getting relief. He came back home, but after a few days there tetanus developed so he took the train and returned to the city on Tuesday morning of last week. However, the disease had gained such headway that nothing could be done for him.
 His remains were brought here and interred in the Evergreen Cemetery on Saturday morning, the funeral services having been held at the Woodville Methodist Church, with Rev. W. W. Hopper officiating.
 The deceased, who was born in West Feliciana Parish on October 14th, 1874, was one of the most popular men of his section, where he was held in high esteem by all who knew him. His sudden taking away has caused deep and sincere sorrow among his large circle

of friends and relatives, and to the writer it marks the passing away of a friendship which has extended over a period of many years.

He leaves a wife and two children, one son and one daughter, a mother, Mrs. Hattie Perkins of this county, and one brother, Dr. L. W. Perkins of California, and one half-sister, Mrs. D. N. Walker of this town. His death to all of them is heart-rending, especially so to his immediate family and to his aged mother, to all of whom we extend the sincere sympathy of one who knew their loved one and prized his friendship.—Woodville Republican.

ROAD DEMONSTRATION NEXT TUESDAY.

The proposed demonstration of road working machinery, under the auspices of the police jury, will begin next Tuesday morning at six o'clock, on the Woodville road, at the limits of the town corporation, and will continue for three days.

Demonstrations are to be given on level roads, sandy roads and hilly roads. The level road work will be done on the Woodville road. For the hill work, the upper Jackson road, in the vicinity of Mr. J. P. Bowman's property, has been selected; while the road between town and the Wickliffe place has been chosen as affording opportunity of showing what can be accomplished in sand and on hills. These three pieces of road will offer a severe test to machinery of this kind, and the time allotted, three days, ought to be long enough to bring out the defects in any of the machinery, considering the terrific strain which will occur in the sand and hills.

Three companies who manufacture road-working machinery already have their outfits here, and are now ready for the demonstration. It is possible, though not certain, that other firms will have machinery here in time to enter the contest.

The public is cordially invited to be present and witness any or all of these tests.

The police jury of East Feliciana expects to send a committee here to witness the demonstration with a view to probable purchases if everything goes as the machinery people anticipate.

GREAT CHIEF TO VISIT LOCAL RED MEN.

On next Friday night, July 25, Tunica Tribe No. 113, Improved Order of Red Men, will hold a meeting of more than usual importance, for at that meeting Great Sachem Peter Bysma, the head of the Order in this reservation, will pay the tribe an official visit.

The Wilmington (N. C.) Morning Star contains the following notice of a West Feliciana boy, F. F. Pillet:

In the construction work of the last two years, which has resulted in transforming Wilmington into a modern city, Mr. F. F. Pillet, the city engineer, who was recently re-elected to succeed himself, has taken a most active and important part. His has been one of the busiest departments under the municipal government and the successful construction of the new streets and other public improvements would have fully demonstrated his unusual ability as an engineer, had such demonstration been necessary. This was not the case, however, for the reason that he had already won his spurs before coming to Wilmington to make his home. Mr. Pillet's work comes under the Department of Streets and Wharves and he does all of the engineering work required by the city. The splendid paving paid for out of the \$300,000 bond issue was done after his plans and under his supervision, as engineer, and they will compare favorably with those of any thoroughfares anywhere, from an engineering point of view, as will also the other public improvements, made since he has held office. Mr. Pillet is a native of Louisiana, having been born in Pointe Coupee Parish, and educated at the State University. Before coming here two years ago, upon the recommendation of some of the most eminent engineers in the South, he was for ten years a resident of Mobile, Ala., where he occupied the position of assistant city engineer.
