#### BARRET CONFIDENT OF VICTORY

city of New Orleans. He will get a majority in the city, as a matter of course, for the ring can always deliver the five or six thousand city employes and their brothers and fathers and uncles, as well as most of the saloon votes, who stay with the ring in exchange for permission to violate the Sunday law and the Gay-Shattuck law.

Up in the parish of Caldwell, Lieut. Governor Barret hit the enemy a knock-out blow the other day. It was at the conclusion of his speech, when Representative McClanahan arose in the audience and said he wanted to ask Mr. Barret a question. The Caldwell legislator, a Pleasant supporter, wanted to know whether Mr. Barret, if elected governor, would close the saloons in New Orleans on Sunday, and the reply came, clear as a bell: "I'll close every saloon in New Orleans on Sunday, and with a notarial seal if necessary. If the city officials won't enforce the laws down there, I'll strive to have passed a law by which they can be ousted from office." While declaring his own intention of voting for Pleasant in the primary, Mr. McClanahan said that Lieut. Governor Barret would carry the parish without trouble.

Another sensation of the week, and possibly the most interesting of all, was the making public, in Shreveport, of Col. Pleasant's labor record (?) Investigation by a committee of the Central Trades and Labor Council of Shreveport showed that in 1903 Col. Pleasant commanded an armed squad which drove fifty union men out of the city on threat of death. The records are there in cold type, and cannot be denied. This record, contrasted with the twenty years of faithful service to organized labor by Mr. Barret as state senator and as lieutenant governor, has served to solidify the labor vote in Shreveport, Monroe, Alexandria, New Orleans and every other city in the state. It will be a big factor in deciding the race for the democratic nomination. "Any union man who refuses to vote for Tom Barret will show that he is ungrateful," said President Theo. J. Greer, of the state federation of labor, who is an ardent supporter of the lieutenant governor, because of his labor record.

The campaign is at an end, and Mr. Barret asks his friends and supporters throughout the state to pay no attention to false and absurd and biased predictions put out by the enemy in an effort to stampede the unthinking voter. He asks them to go to the polls next Tuesday and cast a vote for him, be-

cause such a vote means a vote for clean government and against ring domination of the state for the next four years.

#### PERSONAL OWNERSHIP OF BIRDS ADDS INTEREST TO FARM LIFE.

The object of the poultry club work among the boys and girls is to stimulate an interest in the raising of better poultry and to arouse a greater liking for farm life. Raising and caring for poultry will give the boy or girl something to do that will help develop in him a love for animal life. The personal ownership of a flock of birds will cause him to feel a deeper interest in the business of the farm.

The work is so arranged that the club member may choose one of three ways by which he may begin operations: (1) by rearing chicks from at least two settings of some standard variety of eggs; (2) by caring for at least ten fowls, of any variety, for a period of twelve months; and (3) by caring for at least ten birds of some standard variety and rearing chicks from two settings of eggs from them.

On all of this work the club member is required to keep a complete record of all expenditures and sales, along with other data. A report is to be sent to the Junior Extension office at the end of each month and at the end of the year.

In this club work the hearty cooperation of the parish superintendents, teachers, agents, poultry breeders and business men of the state is desired. —E. O. Edson, Assistant in Charge of Poultry Clubs, Junior Extension division, L. S. U.
