SCHOOL BOARD MINUTES.

The School Board of West Feliciana Parish held its regular quarterly meeting on Saturday, April 1, 1916. All members were present. The two new members, Dr. A. F. Barrow and Mr. B. I. Barrow, having duly qualified, took their seats as regularly constituted members of the Parish School Board.

Minutes of previous quarterly meeting, and of the two called meetings of the Executive Committee, were read and approved as read.

The report of the superintendent for the quarter ending March 31, 1916, was read and ordered spread on the minutes. This report is appended hereto and made a part hereof.

Superintendent Crump reported that he had arranged to purchase a car, but that he needed an extension of credit for this purpose. As he did not wish to ask private individuals to endorse for him and as the car is to be purchased largely to facilitate his work as superintendent, he asked the Board to authorize the President and the Chairman of the Finance Committee to endorse his notes officially, so as to enable him to purchase the car at once.

A motion was made, seconded, and carried, that the President and Chairman of the Finance Committee be authorized to take this action in behalf of the superintendent.

The question of the finances of the Board was taken up. After considerable discussion, a motion was made, seconded and carried that the President appoint a committee to wait upon the Town Council and the Police Jury to ask each body to increase its annual donation to \$1,000.00 in order that no special election would have to be held to vote a special millage for the schools.

The following committee was appointed: Chas. H. Argue, Dr. A. F. Barrow, and R. E. Crump.

On motion and second, the President and the Chairman of the Finance Committee were authorized to arrange a loan with the Bank of Commerce for such sums as may be necessary to pay the current expenses of the Board for the remainder of the session.

As there was no further business to be attended to, the Board, on motion, adjourned.

Superintendent's Quarterly Report. To the Honorable School Board of West Feliciana Parish. Gentlemen:

In compliance with the law, I beg leave to submit herewith my quarterly report on the status of the school system of West Feliciana Parish for the quarter ending March 31, 1916.

PARISH FAIR. I wish to call the attention of the School Board to the organization of a Parish Fair Association. This Association will hold a parish fair next fall. I believe the fair is something of great educational value and should receive the sanction of every one interested in education.

While the School Board may not be able to aid this movement in a financial way to any considerable extent, yet by permitting the superintendent, who has been elected secretary of the Association, to devote a portion of his time and energies to the promotion of the fair, the aid rendered thus indirectly by the School Board will have much to do with the success of the fair.

CLUB WORK. The superintendent has been interested in forming club organizations among the children of the parish. The clubs consist of children who desire to raise corn, pigs, poultry, and tomatoes. It is hoped by interesting the children in these things to form a connecting link between the school and home and bring the school system into more direct contact with the every-day life of the children.

This is strictly in accord with the best educational doctrines of the day. Everywhere there is a great awakening to the needs of the rural school children. Efforts are being made to correlate the school activities with the home and farm activities and thus to bring the education of the child into harmony with its life and surroundings. The tendency is growing apace to make our educational system of more practical value to the after-school-life of the people. I wish to call the attention of the Board to the action of the Executive Committee in authorizing the superintendent to devote a portion of his time to this work, to accept the proffered financial aid of the Junior Extension Department of the State University, whereby it is intended to enable the superintendent to purchase a car and save a large amount of his time in visiting schools and giving more time to be devoted to the schools and to club and other activities. I feel sure that the School Board as a whole will approve this action.

SCHOOL FINANCES. I wish to remind the School Board of the circular letter sent to each member regarding the finances of the school system. This letter was published in the True Democrat at the request of the President and the Vice-President of this Board. I think it would be well for the School Board to devote the

entire time of this session to a discussion of the ways and means to place our school system on a sound financial basis.

We have reached the point where something must be done. We are constantly exceeding our revenues and accumulating an indebtedness which, though comparatively small now, will soon amount to a considerable sum. I do not see any use in postponing the matter and waiting, like Micawber, for something to "turn up." We cannot depend on the Town Council of St. Francisville or the Police Jury of the Parish for aid. Our resources are constantly diminishing while the cost of running the schools remain the same as before and cannot profitably be made less.

I wish to recommend strongly that the Board take this matter under consideration with a view to taking some action toward a final and satisfactory settlement of the problem.

AN ORDINANCE. At a regular meeting of the Police Jury of the Parish of West Feliciana, State of Louisiana, of date Wednesday, April 5, 1916, the following ordinance was adopted: To regulate the police of cattle in the Parish of West Feliciana, to regulate live stock sanitary matters, to prevent the introduction and spread of contagious diseases of live stock, to provide for the appointment of one live stock sanitary inspector for the parish, prescribing his powers, duties and qualifications, to clothe all live stock sanitary inspectors appointed by the Louisiana Live Stock Sanitary Board for this parish with the same authority as the inspector created under this ordinance, and to prescribe penalties for the violation of this ordinance, and to repeal all ordinances or resolutions of this Jury in conflict herewith.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Police Jury of the Parish of West Feliciana, State of Louisiana, in regular session convened: That in order to carry out the proper measures concerning the police of cattle, as well as all other live stock in the Parish of West Feliciana, Louisiana, there shall be, from and after the passage of this ordinance, one live stock inspector created under this ordinance, and the said inspector shall be appointed by the President of the Police Jury immediately after the promulgation of this ordinance, he shall receive a salary of \$50.00 per month, payable out of the fund heretofore set aside by the Police Jury for cattle tick eradication in this parish, unless he be out of funds especially contributed by said board to this parish for the purpose of paying said state inspectors, in which event, the said inspectors shall be paid from the funds of the parish as may be designated by the Louisiana Live Stock Sanitary Board.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, that this Police Jury does hereby accept from the Louisiana Live Stock Sanitary Board the financial and other assistance as the said board and the said United States government may offer for the eradication of cattle fever ticks and other infectious and contagious diseases among cattle and other live stock in this parish, and to that end, all live stock inspectors appointed by the Louisiana Live Stock Sanitary Board for this parish are hereby clothed with the same authority as the inspector created under Section 1 of this ordinance, with full power and authority to make and enforce regulations, and to inspect in this parish, provided that all inspectors thus appointed by said board for this parish shall not be paid any salary or other compensation for their services as inspectors in this parish unless it be out of funds especially contributed by said board to this parish for the purpose of paying said state inspectors, in which event, the said inspectors shall be paid from the funds of the parish as may be designated by the Louisiana Live Stock Sanitary Board.

Section 3. Be it further ordained, etc., that it shall be the duty of said parish live stock sanitary inspector to carry out the provisions of this ordinance relative to the compulsory disinfecting of cattle in the Parish of West Feliciana, and to the proper disinfecting of other live stock as hereinafter provided, and to do all other things required of him by the rules and regulations of the Louisiana Live Stock Sanitary Board for the eradication of cattle fever ticks and other infectious diseases among cattle and other live stock in the Parish of West Feliciana.

The said parish inspector shall serve during such period of time as may be designated by the executive officer of the Louisiana Live Stock Sanitary Board, and as aforesaid, receive his compensation as above provided only for the months in which he is actually occupied as inspector under this ordinance.

Section 4. Be it further ordained, etc., that from and after the passage of this ordinance, no cattle shall be driven, allowed, or moved by rail, boat or other carrier into the Parish of West Feliciana, Louisiana, from any area in the United States that is quarantined by the United States secretary of agriculture to prevent the spread of splenic or tick fever in cattle until they have been dipped in an approved manner in the standard arsenical solution or otherwise properly disinfected under the supervision of a duly authorized inspector of the Louisiana State Live Stock Sanitary Board, or a veterinary inspector of the United States bureau of animal industry duly commissioned as an inspector of the Louisiana State Live Stock Sanitary Board.

Section 5. Be it further ordained, that from and after the passage of this ordinance, horses and mules entering the Parish of West Feliciana shall be free of cattle ticks (Margaropus Anulatus). When any cattle, horses or mules are received at a railroad station in this parish from any point in the United States that is quarantined by the United States secretary of agriculture to prevent the spread of splenic or tick fever in cattle, it shall be the duty of the said railroad agent to notify the nearest live stock sanitary inspector of the parish, and the horses or mules must not be removed from the station stock pens until permission to do so has been received from the live stock sanitary inspector of the parish who may be nearest to said railroad station, or from a duly authorized inspector of the Louisiana State Sanitary Board.

Section 6. Be it further ordained, that from and after the passage of this ordinance, all persons owning or having in their charge, as owners, agents or otherwise, cattle in the Parish of West Feliciana, Louisiana, that are infected with, or exposed to, cattle fever ticks, shall have all such cattle at a regular disinfecting station situated in the ward in which said person may reside, or in which his cattle may be, at such times as may be designated by the parish live stock sanitary inspector or inspectors, or by any of the inspectors appointed by the Louisiana State Live Stock Sanitary Board working in this parish for the purpose of having said cattle inspected, provided, that all such persons shall, when said inspectors intend to disinfect said cattle for the first time after the passage of this ordinance, receive a written notice from said inspector or inspectors stating the day and date and place at which said cattle are to be brought, and thereafter, all of said persons shall be required, without further notice, to bring all of their cattle to the same station (unless another station be designated by the inspector in writing) for the purpose of having said cattle properly disinfected every 21 days after the date of the first disinfecting, provided that if the 21st day fall on Sunday, said cattle shall be brought to said stations for the purpose stated on the Monday following the said Sunday.

That the words "properly disinfected" within the meaning of this section of this ordinance is intended to mean that said cattle shall be dipped in the standard arsenical solution provided for that purpose by the Parish of West Feliciana.

Section 7. Be it further ordained, that from and after the passage of this ordinance, all persons owning or having in their charge, as owners, agents or otherwise, horses or mules that are infected with, or exposed to, cattle fever ticks, shall have all such horses or mules at a regular disinfecting station situated in the ward in which said person may reside, or in which his cattle may be, at such times as may be designated by the parish live stock sanitary inspector or inspectors, or by any of the inspectors appointed by the Louisiana State Live Stock Sanitary Board working in this parish for the purpose of having said horses and mules properly disinfected, provided that, in the sense of this section the words "properly disinfected" are intended to mean that the said horses and mules shall be dipped in the standard arsenical solution provided for that purpose, or simply sprayed with a proper disinfectant in the discretion of the inspector.

Section 8. Be it further ordained, etc., that should any cattle, horses or mules from any infected area, drift, swim or otherwise, be introduced into this parish, this ordinance, the same shall be quarantined and disinfected at the expense of said owner or owners thereof. Any infected cattle, horses or mules within the parish shall, after due notice, shall fall to disinfect in a manner satisfactory to the inspectors of this parish shall be placed in quarantine and disinfected at

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the expense of said owner or owners, and if the owner or owners of said animals be known to the said inspectors such animals shall be quarantined, disinfected and cared for and any expense thus incurred shall be paid by the owner of such animals before the same are released by the inspector. All notices so collected shall be turned over to the parish treasurer and placed in the fund set aside for the eradication of cattle ticks and other contagious diseases in cattle.

Section 9. Be it further ordained, that nothing in this ordinance shall be construed to amend, alter or modify any of the rules of the Louisiana State Live Stock Sanitary Board with reference to its authority to appoint inspectors, or the power and authority of said inspectors granted by the statutes of the State of Louisiana, it being intended that the provisions of this ordinance shall be applied in conjunction with said Louisiana State Live Stock Sanitary Board and the United States bureau of animal industry.

Section 10. Be it further ordained, that any person, persons, individual, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction shall, for the first offense be fined in the sum of not less than \$25.00, nor more than \$50.00, or shall be imprisoned in the parish jail subject to work on the public roads of the parish for a term not

less than 10 or more than 15 days, and on conviction of the second or subsequent offense, shall be fined in the sum of not less than \$50.00, nor more than \$100.00, or imprisoned in the parish jail, subject to work on the public roads of the parish, for a term of not less than 20 nor more than 30 days, or both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court. Section 11. Be it further ordained, that
