AN ORDINANCE

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of St. Francisville, Louisiana, that the Ordinance hereinafter passed and adopted, on the 24th day of September, 1918, be amended and re-adopted so as to read as follows, to-wit:

Section One. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of St. Francisville, That the Mayor of the Town be and he is hereby authorized and instructed to purchase from C. H. Jenks, the following described property for the Town of St. Francisville, delivered and erected in the water and light plant of said Town, to-wit: One motor and pump, and well equipment, strainer and piping, and the necessary equipment for the installation of same, and is evidence that the vendor at this date has sold and delivered said property and performed the obligations of his contract made on the ... day of ..., 1918. The contract price for said property delivered and erected in the sum of Four Thousand Dollars; and the amount of this Certificate is now due and payable on the date aforesaid.

Be it further ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of St. Francisville, Louisiana, That the Mayor is authorized and instructed for and on behalf of the Town of St. Francisville, to sign an act of sale and mortgage securing the deferred payment for the property to be purchased as aforesaid, and the Certificates representing the said payments by mortgage and vendor's privilege on the property purchased, and pledge of the excess revenues of the water and light plant of the Town of St. Francisville, arising from the operation of said plant above its cost of operation and upkeep, and by pledge of Four (4) Mills of the taxes and revenues of the general levy which the municipality is authorized to levy, for the years 1919, 1920, 1921 and 1922.

Corn growing is steadily improving in Louisiana. Its importance cannot be overestimated. This is the view entertained by the State Fair Association, which offers approximately \$1,000 in cash premiums for the best specimens of corn at this year's State Fair, October 30 to November 4, inclusive.

Some years ago corn was considered only a secondary crop in many sections of Louisiana, but the situation is changing, due to the efforts of the State Fair and other agencies working for the greater upbuilding of the state's resources, and there seems to be no limit to the possibilities connected with the production of this product. The premiums are offered, not only to encourage more farmers to raise corn on a large scale, but to impress the corn growers with the necessity of using advanced methods, selecting good seed and following other modern plans for developing the industry.

That wonderful strides have been made will be evidenced by the big exhibition at the State Fair. It will be in charge of Prof. A. F. Kidder, of the chair of agronomy, Louisiana State University.

With the country at war and the need for food production the largest in history, Uncle Sam is looking to the farmers to produce more than ever before. Every ear of corn produced is a bullet for the Kaiser. The State Fair is a school for learning how best to produce it.
