A WINNFIELD PRODUCT.

We have upon our desk a rare specimen of tropical fruit of the lemon variety grown on the place of Mr. I. S. Walker in the suburbs of Winnfield. We have had occasion to mention the products of Mr. Walker before as he is an enthusiastic horticulturist and his place is noted for peaches, pears, grapes, and the writer has been the recipient of many beautiful flowers from his garden. His crowning glory has been the "Wonder Lemon," of which we produce a picture from a photograph

of the real thing with foliage of the tree in the background. The sample upon our desk weighs two and one-half pounds and measures around the middle eighteen inches. The specimen we have before us was not chosen for its size, as there are others on the tree still larger. It is as large as a good sized cantelope and is as sour and finely flavored as a Sicily or any other lemon. It would make two or three gallons of lemonade. Mr. Walker is doing a good business in demonstrating the possibilities of fruit raising in this section.
