

POINTS REGARDING THE CENSUS

The census begins April 15 and must be completed in two weeks in cities and in thirty days in all other areas.

The enumerators will wear a badge inscribed "United States Census, 1910."

The law requires every adult person to furnish the prescribed information, but also provides that it shall be treated confidentially, so that no injury can come to any person from answering the questions.

The President has issued a proclamation, calling on all citizens to co-operate with the Census and assuring them that it has nothing to do with taxation, army or jury service, compulsory school attendance, regulation of immigration, or enforcement of any law, and that no one can be injured by answering the inquires.

It is of the utmost importance that the census of population and agriculture in this state be complete and correct.

Therefore every person should promptly, accurately, and completely answer the Census questions asked by the enumerators.

Enumerators Appointed.

Hon. O. M. Grisham, Supervisor of the United States Census for this, the Sixth District of Louisiana, has announced the appointment of the following named enumerators for the wards and districts in the parish of Winn as below:

Ward 7—District 131, no appointment; District 132, James W. Faith.
It will be noted that no appointments appear in the above list for Wards 8, 9 and 10, and that no appointments are named for District 129 of Ward 6 and District 131 of Ward 7. Just why this condition exists we are not aware, but suppose that arrangements will be made for enumerators for the additional wards named and for the two districts in wards 6 and 7.

New Apparatus Arrives.

The Winnfield Fire Company have just received a part of the new equipment purchased a short time ago. This first shipment consists of 1600 feet "Eureka Special," 2 1-2 fire hose, three shut off nozzles, three hose relief valves and one ring expander. The three new hose carts are now in transit and the fire company are expecting them in any day. The hook and ladder truck, having to be built special will be delayed possibly 30 days.

The boys now have in total, 3000 feet of hose and when the new hose carts arrive they will be in position to play a stream of water on almost any building situated within the corporate limits. Winnfield should be proud of this little organization which with the new apparatus will be one of the best volunteer fire departments in the state.

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
