BE IT KNOWN AND REMEMBERED, That on this the 30th day of March, 1910, before me Robert Wade Oglesby, Notary Public in and for the Parish of Winn, State of Louisiana, personally appeared the parties whose names hereunto subscribed, being more than three in number, and all of legal age, who severally declared that they do hereby form and organize themselves into a corporation for a term of fifty (50) years from this date under the name of LOUISIANA MERCANTILE COMPANY, the domicile whereof is fixed in the Town of Winnfield, Winn Parish, Louisiana, and its objects and purposes and business being to carry on a general mercantile business.

Citation shall be served on the President or in his absence, on the Secretary. The capital stock shall be Ten Thousand Dollars each, payable in cash.
