### High School Notes.

The Base Ball team played three games with Dodson, here last Friday and Saturday and were successful in winning the series by taking two of the three games.

The first game was won by a score of 19 to 9, in one of the biggest hit and run games of the season. Both hurlers, Smith for the locals and Waters for the visitors, were batted freely, but poor fielding on the part of the visitors netted our boys the winning end.

The second game was lost by a very close margin, the score being 9 to 8. "Strings" Cupp was in the firing pit for our team and showed good form by holding the terrible Dodson batters down in a surprising manner.

The third game was hotly contested, but with "Big Un" Smith in the box the Dodsonian sluggers only rapped out two hits and crossed the pan only once, eight nearly breaking their back fishing after the "spitter."

The next series will be played with the Boys High School of New Orleans, five games will be played beginning Wednesday, May 25, and continuing through Saturday 28th. These games will be hard fought, and shall give the local fans an opportunity to see some real baseball.

The first commencement program will be given next Wednesday evening, by the High School Literary Societies. The subject will be "The South." No admission will be charged. On Thursday evening the music department and chorus will give their program. A small admission will be charged to defray expenses. Friday evening will be devoted to the graduating exercises.

### Senator Oglesby in a Wreck.

The southbound passenger train on the Valley route of the Louisiana Railway & Navigation Co., was derailed and wrecked at a switch four miles above Baton Rouge at an early hour last Monday morning. The engineer and fireman, both residents of New Orleans, were pinned under the capsized engine and killed. The balance of the train crew and passengers, among the latter being Senator Oglesby, of Winnfield, and many other returning members of the Legislature, escaped with a good shaking up and only slight injuries.

### Decoration Day


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
