The Bank of Winnfield.

At the annual meeting of the stockholders of the Bank of Winnfield, held July 4th, the following Board of Directors were re-elected: Geo. P. Long, Dr. I. E. Siess, B. W. Bailey, F. L. Shaw, M. Bernstein, O. M. Grisham, W. F. Cooper, A. B. Hall, J. S. Hunt, H. T. Pye and J. R. Heard.

The bank having earned 10 per cent during the past six months, a semi-annual dividend of 5 per cent was ordered paid.
