

## WINNFIELD HIGH SCHOOL OPENING

Last Monday the Eight Months Grind Began Under Most Favorable Auspices. The Opening Exercises Were Largely Attended by Patrons of the School.

The Winnfield High School opened on Monday morning Sept. 5 for the session of 1910-11 under most favorable auspices. The conditions seem ideal for the most successful year in the history of the school. Mr. W. J. Avery, the principal on whose shoulders rests the burden of executive power, comes to our town well recommended for the place he is to fill. His reputation is that of a thorough disciplinarian, and a man well qualified to direct the affairs of the school as he feels they should be directed. The systematic manner in which he conducted the opening of the school and the methodical way in which he began to dispose of knotty problems, appealed to the observer as every evidence that he is and means to be master of the situation. He is very fortunate in having a corps of able and enthusiastic young teachers as his assistants. Mr. Nixon our able superintendent seems to have made very happy selections in all departments.

The High School department will be under the direction of the following teachers; Messrs. Fontenot and Harrell; Misses Nolen, Redwine, and Graham. The grammar grades will be taught by Mr. Pugh, Misses Davis, Holmes, Langford, and Harper; while the primary grades are still in charge of those efficient and popular teachers, Misses Jackson, Peters, and

Huey. The singing and drawing is still under the able direction of Miss Gibson.

A new department has been added to the school this session, that of expression and physical culture, with Miss Ella Ewing as teacher. The school is very fortunate in having in this department a young woman of such charming personality as Miss Ewing.

The study of piano is under the direction of the Misses Gamble and Ewing. These young ladies are well prepared to fill the positions they hold, having studied under some of the ablest musicians of the south.

### THE OPENING.

Long before the hour for the opening of school throngs of children had assembled at the door of the school. An unusually large number of patrons and friends joined them in time to listen to the addresses delivered by Sen. Oglesby and Hon. Cas Moss. Both addresses were congratulatory of the management of the school and very happily delivered. Mr. Avery then made a short address outlining some plans and expressing his pleasure at the presence of so many patrons, school board members, town officials and others. After the singing of America by the entire audience the teachers conducted the children to their respective rooms. The total enrollment for the day was 437.

### Watkins Elected.

J. T. Watkins of Minden has been renominated for Congress from the Fourth Louisiana District over Judge A. J. Murf of Shreveport, and his majority will be overwhelming when the totals are cast up.

Unofficial figures give Watkins a majority of about 2,250, the Minden man having carried every parish in the district including Caddo, Judge Murf's home. The majorities as estimated for the various parishes are as follows:

While no official figures have been received from any of the parishes, enough is known to show that Congressman Watkins beat Judge Murf in every parish. The Shreveport man virtually gave up the fight when it was seen that Shreveport and Caddo were going against him.

Mr. Tulane Smith went to Winnfield Tuesday.


