

Tremont & Gulf Road to be Sold.

Chicago, Sept. 15.—The Rock Island Railroad Company has under consideration the purchase of the Tremont & Gulf Railway of Louisiana, but negotiations for the transfer of the property have not yet been completed. The property is for sale and the local Rock Island officials admit that system is considering taking it over. "We were asked to consider the purchase of the Tremont & Gulf property," said President Henry U. Mudge this afternoon. "But as yet no deal has been made."

Beyond this statement Mr. Mudge had nothing further to say on the subject.

Artesian Well.

J. D. Pace has completed boring the artesian well for the Mansfield Hardwood Company's mill in the eastern part of the city. The depth of 183 feet was reached and it is flowing over with as nice clear water as could be wished for. Mr. Pace says that the well is one of the prettiest that he ever saw, and says that the town authorities are figuring with him to bore another artesian well for the town because the two present wells at the waterworks plant are inadequate to meet the demand since the water mains have been extended fully 8,000 feet. It is now difficult to keep the reservoir full, on account of the dry weather this summer.

Judge Murff Resigns.

Judge Murff, the defeated candidate for congress in this district, has resigned. In his card to the people of Caddo Parish Judge Murff says:

"I have two more years on the bench, and could go on and serve them out, but I feel that I am losing financially every day I remain on the bench and that the sooner I get back into practice the better it will be for me for it is more remunerative than the judgeship. I have been advised to remain on the bench for the next two years and punish my political enemies, but my high appreciation of the duties and responsibilities of my office will not permit me to prostitute it by using it as a means of gratifying any personal or political grievance I may have. As I said in my platform for congress. When ever a representative of the people cannot carry out the wishes of the people, he should hand them back his commission, as unsullied as when he received it. This, I shall do, with the judgeship, and not use it for any ignoble purpose, even against my political enemies."

"For these reasons I have decided to tender my resignation as district judge to the governor, to take effect November 6, 1910, or as soon as my successor can be elected, as I do not wish to clog the court proceedings, or inconvenience the people. You will, therefore, take due notice and govern yourself accordingly."

The management have leased the Opera House, furnishing it with new scenery and stage properties and will give the public first class entertainment.


The Semons Twins will be the attractions in vaudeville tonight and tomorrow night. Next week there will be an entire change of program.
