Take Notice.

To the Patrons of the Winnfield High School:

The daily session of the school begins at 8:50 and the pupils are required to come to the school not earlier than 8:25 nor later than 8:50 the time for opening. Up to date a number of pupils have been arriving at any time between 8:00 and 9:00. They come for the sole purpose of playing and not for study. The parents are, therefore, kindly requested to help out in the matter of disciplining by keeping their children at home until the proper time to start from home. Further, they are requested to start them in plenty of time to reach the school in time to pass into their rooms when the bell rings.

The school is dismissed promptly at 3:55 and parents may expect the pupils at home within a reasonable time thereafter, depending upon the distance they live from school. They are detained sometimes, however, to make up work, but the facts about each pupil can be readily obtained from the teacher or from the principal. I have noticed that many of the children do not go home immediately after the dismissal of school but spend a large part of the afternoon on the streets. That is a matter about which the school will have nothing to do more than inform parents, upon inquiry, whether the children were detained at school.

A pupil who is absent or tardy is required to present a written excuse for same before he can re-enter his room. Considerable leniency has been shown in this matter up to date, but parents need not expect it to be shown in the future, as all the pupils are fully aware of the requirement.

I shall thank the patrons of the school to give their co-operation in these matters, as they have already shown a willingness to do in others.
