

Extra Session Called.

Baton Rouge, La., Nov. 16.—This afternoon at 5:30 o'clock Charles K. Fuqua, private secretary to Governor Sanders, gave out the official call of Governor Sanders for an extra session of the General Assembly of the state to be held in Baton Rouge for a period of ten days beginning Nov. 23, to amend the law for New Orleans relative to the issuance of the eight million dollar sewerage and water board bonds, to change the laws pertaining to the assessment of stock of state and national banks, to insert an enacting clause in Act No. 349 of 1910, to provide for the expenses of the session, for the senate to confirm appointments made by the Governor since the last session, and to elect a United States Senator. There are nine subjects given in the call, but the first four are devoted to the different laws on the sewerage and water board bond issue.
