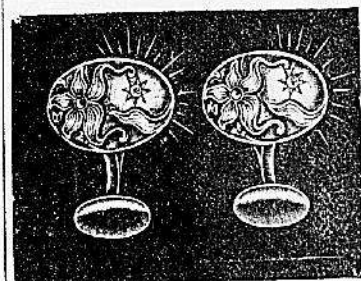

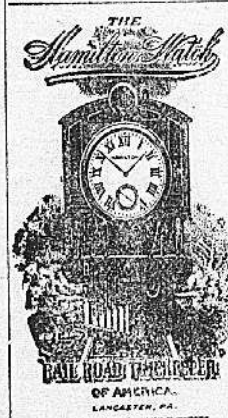

ELECTION PROMULGATION.

State of Louisiana,
Parish of Winn.
Be it remembered, That we the undersigned
Board of Supervisors of Election for the Parish
of Winn, State of Louisiana, did this day re-
pair to the Court House of said Parish for the
purpose of compiling the returns sent in by the
Commissioners of election from the polling
places of the Parish of Winn of an election
held therein on the 6th day of December,
1910, on the question of levying a five mill road
tax in said parish, and in accordance
with an ordinance of the Police Jury of date of
Oct. 5th, 1910, agreeable to the laws of this
State and in pursuance to the proclamation of
the Police Jury of the Parish of Winn, and then

the presence of D. F. Dunn and S. M. Abel, com-
petent witnesses and qualified electors, and as
many others as have chosen to attend to
compile said returns, and having ascertained
from said compilation that the votes cast at
said polling places in Winn Parish, the ques-

five years on all taxable property of said Winn
Parish in aid of public road system, are as
