**Speaks of Plans of the Louisiana Conservation Commission.**

The Fort Worth (Tex.) Record of recent date printed the following interview with a member of the Louisiana State Conservation Commission about the plans for saving the natural resources:

"Louisiana conservationists have gone Gifford Pinchot one better," declared H. P. Gamble, of Winnfield, a member of the Conservation Commission of the Pelican State, who spent Thursday in Fort Worth. He and H. E. Hardtner, of Urania, La., chairman of the commission, have just been to Guthrie to confer with the Oklahoma State officials on the collection of a conservation tax, and Mr. Gamble returned to Fort Worth to spend a day with relatives here.

"Louisiana is in advance of all the States along conservation lines," Mr. Gamble said. "Now this is not an idle flattery of ourselves," he continued, "for we have the testimony of Ex-President Roosevelt to this effect. He made such a statement in a recent Cincinnati address when Governor Sanders, of Louisiana, was seated on the platform. We now have laws protecting the deposits of oil and gas and the timber resources of the State. While we have large interests in all of these things, there has also been a large waste and we found it necessary to conserve what remains.

"On our visit to Oklahoma we found the commissioners there collecting a tax on the gross value of the annual product of oil and gas. There is some difficulty in arriving at the value, and I believe that Louisiana has got the better scheme of levying a conservation tax on the gross annual product. The companies pay a tax for the new year on a basis of their product for the past year.

"We have a number of interests that need conserving and found it necessary to get in on the ground floor immediately in order to save the resources of the State to future generations. One of the problems in connection with the conservation of timber is to protect the virgin forests from fires, Louisiana is the second State in the Union in the production of pine, and second in cypress and there is a vast amount of other valuable timber there. One of the schemes is to have the State buy some of the denuded forest lands and reforest them. Then the State will endeavor to preserve the forests near the big streams for the overflows have never been so bad where there is a forest to hold the waters in check.

"The majority of our conservation laws were passed by the 1910 Legislature and they cover all phases of the conservation problem. There are twenty-nine of them, including the game laws, which are very popular.

"But I think our State is entitled to the distinction of originality in that it has set out to make the people who have grown rich in the destruction of the State's natural resources pay a special conservation tax to help restore the land. This law has not been tested yet, as it goes into effect in January, and the taxes under this law are payable in the months of January and February. I believe we have

the rich men where they have to come across?"

Mr. Gamble, who is an attorney, framed practically all of the conservation laws enacted in his State, though he attributes Louisiana's front rank in conservation to Gov. J. Y. Sanders, of whom he is a great admirer.

**Colored Teachers' Institute.**

The second annual session of the Winn Parish Colored Teachers Association convened in Winnfield at the colored school building on Friday and Saturday, Dec. 16th and 17th with ten teachers present, two being absent. Prof. W. Leslie Levi was elected president; Prof. W. M. McDonald, vice-president; Miss Mattie Jackson, recording secretary; Prof. Amos McCarty, treasurer. Prof. Jas. W. Cassey was elected delegate to the State Teachers Association, which convenes next April. The election of officers being over the teachers got busy to carry out the program, which had been arranged by the committee for this meeting.

**PROGRAM.**

1st. What to do with the first day of school," M. T. Moulton. He being absent, Prof. A. C. Peters opened the discussion.

2nd. "The qualifications of a teacher," W. M. McDonald.

3rd. "The duty of a teacher," Miss Esther Grundy.

4th. How to teach language to beginners, H. L. Thomas.

5th. The treatment of school evils, Miss Mattie Jackson.

6th. The kind of punishment, Amos McCarty.

7th. Discipline, A. C. Peters.

8th. Cautions to teachers, Miss Alice Grundy.

9th. How to secure attention when conducting a recitation, W. Leslie Levi.

These subjects proved to be very interesting and much that was valuable was learned from the discussion of them.

We regretted very much that our Superintendent, Hon. J. J. Mixon, was not present, but he could not as he was sick.

The closing address, "Elementary Manual Training and its Relation to our Public Schools," was delivered by Prof. Jas. W. Cassey, who brought out many helpful suggestions for colored people on this subject. The speaker said that the time had come when the colored people must take more interest in their schools; that they must help the school board by purchasing one or more acres of land to have industrial farms where manual training could be taught in an up-to-date manner.

A committee of five was appointed to draft a set of resolutions to the Superintendent and members of the school board and the good white people of Winn parish for the interest which they are manifesting in the welfare of the colored people of Winn parish. They will be published later.

A vote of thanks was extended to Prof. W. Leslie Levi and the patrons of his school for the hospitality which had been shown to the teachers while attending the institute.

On Saturday at 1 p. m. we adjourned by shaking hands and singing, "God be with you till we meet again," and thus the second annual session passed into history.
