The following named patriotic young men of St. Mary Parish, passed this week the necessary examinations to enter the navy, both before the recruiting officer, temporarily stationed here, and before the medical examining board stationed at New Orleans, Messrs. Ernest D. Latham, Lennis Olivier and Jesse Cowan. They are all intelligent, vigorous young Americans, and we predict that some will prove more loyal to country and duty than they. The United States Navy is in need of recruits. It is, therefore, to their credit that they voluntarily answered to the call of their country. They are all young men under the age of twenty-one years. Young Latham is only sixteen years of age, but his splendid physical development is that usually of eighteen years. This fact, with his mental capacity and education, together with the consent of his parents, caused the Bureau of Navigation, Navy Department, Washington, D. C., to gladly accept him. They are now in the U. S. Naval Training School, at Great Lakes, Illinois, where they will remain for six months, before being put in the actual services of Uncle Sam. Last Monday night a meeting was held by a number of the citizens of Franklin for the purpose of organizing a Mardi Gras Association. From the names of the persons who started this movement, we are confident that on Mardi Gras next year Franklin will have a pageant which will be both attractive and amusing.

Mr. Harry Hine left Franklin last Monday evening in his gas boat for his fishing campon Onion Bayou, near Cote Blanche. He had informed the inmates of his camp that he would arrive there during the night. His failure to arrive during the night and the next day, made his companions uneasy, and they sent a messenger to Franklin to learn whether he had left Franklin. It being definitely ascertained that he left the landing at the Basin for home after sunset Monday evening, his friends became alarmed about him. They immediately organized a rescue party. This party searched carefully the waters between the landing here and the coast. On Wednesday morning this party of searchers found the boat of Mr. Hine afloat near Catfish Point, but it was empty and adrift. Presuming that he had fallen from the boat into the water and was drowned they instituted search for his body, but up to this writing it has not been found. Since the above was put in type and as we are about to go to press, the body of Mr. Hine was found yesterday evening about 3 o'clock near Catfish Point, and his remains brought to Franklin. An inquest was held and the coroner's jury rendered a verdict of accidental drowning. His remains were interred yesterday evening at 8 o'clock.
