WOMEN TO LEARN PRACTICAL LESSONS.

The women who attend the twelfth annual Farmers Week, to be held at the Louisiana State University, January 8-13, will have the opportunity of assisting in the arrangement of a model kitchen, in the making various kinds of hats, in managing poultry and in learning how to have home conveniences on the farm. The program of work includes other interesting subjects also which should attract the farm women and should be an inducement to those who are able to leave their homes to avail themselves of the week's course of intensive practical training.

A kitchen in the rough has been set up for use as a laboratory in which the women will work. They will plan the kind of walls, will select the simple and necessary equipment and arrange it so as to be convenient. They will arrange the furniture in the best suited places so that at the end of their week's work they will have constructed a typical small farm home kitchen, showing all of the little improvements that can be made to make a convenient and comfortable workshop out of the kitchen.

A small plan of the house is under construction now which will feature the kitchen, the bathroom and a laundry room for the purpose of showing how the farm home can have lights, running water and laundry fixtures installed step by step at a very nominal cost. This work will be in charge of Edwin B. Dorah, professor of farm mechanics at the University.

"We are planning to make the work as practical as possible," says Miss Norma Overbey, state home demonstration agent, who has charge of the women's work during this short course. "The business firms in the city of Baton Rouge have promised to cooperate with us and have agreed to make displays of their kitchen and housing equipment so we can show the women the most desirable types of equipment to try to obtain. This will supplement our work very well, as it would be impractical to have all this material assembled at the University. We will have a store of goodly and practical knowledge and information to any woman who takes part in the course."
