Three carloads of piping and casing arrived here Friday from Beaumont, Texas, to be used in the oil well now being put down by the Jones Development company.


T. D. Calkins, of the banking firm of Calkins, Spalding & company, which was last week merged into the Welsh National Bank, has located and organized a bank in Ganado, Texas, to be known as Calkins, Silliman & Co., bankers.

Frederick C. Hubell, a capitalist of Des Moines, Iowa, was here last Friday and purchased thirty acres of land adjacent to the Welsh oil field. He also went to Jennings and bought \$10,000 worth of stock in the Southern Oil Co. at \$110. Mr. Hubell thinks this section is the Golconda of America.

The Southern Pacific has completed a switch on the south side of the main line, extending from near the depot to the trestle east of town, and is about a mile in length. It is the opinion of many that the passenger depot, long since promised, will be built soon now that the south side switch is in. A new depot is almost a necessity for the safety of the traveling public.

Everyone purchasing a buggy from the Davidson-Wesson Implement Co. will be given a large umbrella.

Miss Mary McNapsy, who taught in the Welsh public school during the year just closed, left Tuesday to spend the summer at her home in Kansas. She will return in the fall to resume her school work, as she has been re-employed to teach the coming term.

As the building now occupied by the Calcasieu Implement company will soon be vacated for the First National Bank of Welsh, the Calcasieu company will utilize the present warehouse in which to conduct the business until the first of the year, when Mr. Daniels expects to erect a new building.

Last week's storm did considerable damage to the pumping plants east of here. At the Keystone plant two large smokestacks were blown down and much other damage was done to the buildings and pumping engines. At New Iberia the roof of the opera house was blown off and many smaller buildings were unroofed.

Many farmers on the various plants near town claim that they are threatened with salt water, and a heavy rain is necessary for the assurance of a good rice crop. At the Illinois plant crabs are being pumped up, which are said to be forerunners of salt water. From other points comes the report that pumping plants are furnishing an abundant supply of fresh water and the rice is thoroughly flooded and looks well.

The street sprinkler has ceased to sprinkle for lack of patronage and now on busy days Welsh is a cloud of dust from morning until night. Every business man should subscribe something toward maintaining a street sprinkler, as it will greatly lessen the labor of keeping everything tidy and clean, add much to our comfort and greatly improve sanitary condition. We hope to soon see the streets in front of every business house in town sprinkled.

The board of directors of the Welsh Oil and Land Development company at a recent meeting decided to put on sale at par \$10,000 more of their capital stock. Saturday a party from Lake Charles offered to take the entire amount, but the board refused to dispose of only a portion of the stock as it is the intention of the officers of the company to have as large a representation as possible. As there is no question as to the existence of oil on the property owned by this corporation the remainder of the shares will only be on the market a short time.
