The mayor and board of trustees of Welsh are to be commended for passing the ordinances which are published in the JOURNAL this week. For some time, in fact ever since the town has begun to grow, there has been a demand for an ordinance against allowing cattle to run at large upon the streets and also for better chimneys as a safeguard against fire. These two ordinances are timely and will meet with the approval of a large majority of the citizens of the town. The mayor and board of trustees are all representative citizens and whatever action they take in their official capacities we may rest assured is for the best interest of the town, and it is the duty of every citizen, who wants to see the town grow and prosper to uphold the town authorities in all they do that tends to the betterment of the town.

By the terms of the act of congress granting \$5,000,000 in aid of the Louisiana Purchase Exposition at St. Louis the appropriation was made conditionally, the requirement being that twice the amount should be expended by the exhibition company in preparing for the fair as a guaranty of good faith. This having been accomplished, the contribution of the Federal government now becomes available. The appropriations made by forty-five foreign nations, which have signified their willingness to become exhibitors, amount in the aggregate to over \$6,000,000, several of the co-operating nations having increased the amount of their contemplated expenditures when they realized the magnitude of the forthcoming exposition. The forwardness of the enterprise is gratifying, and the gratification should not be confined to St. Louis; the whole nation is interested in the success of the centenary celebration of its first and most important act of expansion.

## Crop Conditions.

**COTTON:** Ideal weather for cotton picking prevailed in all parts of the State throughout the week. Picking has been pushed forward vigorously, and while a few localities report the bulk of the crop picked, and others that picking is only well under way, the reports from the principal cotton growing parishes indicate that from one-third to one-half of the crop has been picked. Generally the yield is below an average, and in some localities it is very light. There are no prospects for a top crop.

**SUGAR CANE:** Continued dry weather, with hot days and cool nights in the sugar region have further retarded the growth of the crop. The cane crop cannot now come up to its normal size by the grinding season, which is almost here. Notwithstanding the present weather conditions have checked the growth of the stalk, they are conducive to the development of the sucrose content.

**RICE:** Under favorable weather conditions rice harvest has progressed rapidly and is nearly completed in most sections. Threshing is progressing satisfactorily. The crop is turning out a good yield of excellent quality.

**CORN:** The weather has been favorable for gathering corn, which has been pushed forward when time could be spared from other crops.

**MISCELLANEOUS:** The bulk of the hay crop has been saved in excellent condition. The continued dry weather has injured truck gardens. Sweet potatoes are a good crop.

## The Prosperous South.

The new south is vying with that the old ever claimed to be in the way of prosperity. There is a tide of money and immigration setting in here that cannot be stopped by breakwaters, no matter how large, how well fortified and how impregnable. The papers throughout the North are referring to it and this is a certain sign that those who dislike to see their countrymen leave are certainly going through that very experience.

All along the Southern coast there are little indications that when put in a whole make the big ocean with its tiny drops. The scene is attractive, even alluring to the Southern boy reared with the old time religion of the old time South firmly implanted in his veins and the fire of patriotic spirit blazing out from every nerve. The old South with its fond memories and traditions is giving away to the new South with its smoke stacks, its long fields of verdant richness and its prosperous farmer, mechanic, merchant and professional man. The old South was prosperous in a measure and was becoming more so but its strides never did reach the magnitude of the leaps today. Each day brings out an item that proves this conclusion and every paper in every section has now and then comment and news of this nature.

Noting that thirty-eight per cent of the total exports of the country for the past year originated in the Southern states, the Railway World says the development of that section is well illustrated by the growth of cotton mills along the lines of the Southern railway. Since January 1, 1903, there have been added twenty-seven new plants, including nineteen cotton mills and eight knitting mills, which have added to the total equipment 20,134 looms and 727,358 spindles.

There are now under construction twenty-three other mills, with an equipment of 14,025 looms and 500,312 spindles, making a grand total existing and in sight of 642 mills, 185,738 looms and 6,976,800 spindles.

The same paper calls attention to the extraordinary railroad expansion of the South. In 1880 that section had but 20,500 miles, whereas in 1900 there were over 54,000 miles, representing a new influx of capital to the amount of \$1,500,000,000. This growth of mileage has had its sequel in a tremendous growth of business. Products formerly worthless for want of access to the world's markets now quicken the currents of trade.—Beaumont Enterprise.

## ORDINANCE NO. 94.

Levying General Revenue Taxes for the Town of Welsh, La., for the year of 1903, and a special tax for public school purposes.  
Section 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Trustees of the Town of Welsh, Louisiana, that a tax of ten mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation for 1903, of all taxable property situated in the Town of Welsh, Louisiana, be and the same is hereby levied for general revenue purposes. That a tax of five mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation for 1903, of all taxable property situated in the said Town of Welsh, be and the same is hereby levied for public school purposes.

## ORDINANCE NO. 95

Ordering sidewalks to be built on the south side of Nicholls Street:  
Section 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Trustees of the Town of Welsh, Louisiana, in compliance with a petition presented by the resident owners of a majority of the property abutting on the Street proposed to be improved by the building of sidewalks, that the Board of Trustees do and they are hereby authorized to order that a sidewalk be built on the South side of Nicholls Street, commencing at a point opposite the South East corner of Block No. Forty, thence West along the South side of Nicholls Street to the intersection of the South West corner of Block No. Forty-four. That said walk be built on the grade line as established by the town engineer, under and by the authority of this board. That any property owner who may desire to lay brick or cement walks, may do so on the grade established by said town engineer.  
Section 2. Be it further ordained, &c., That it shall be the duty of all owners of property fronting and abutting on that part of Nicholls Street herein named to construct or cause to be constructed a sidewalk, within twenty days from adoption and promulgation of this ordinance, and in case of failure or neglect said sidewalk to be built according to the further provisions of said Ordinance No. Fifty-two.  
Section 3. Be it further ordained, &c., That the Board of Trustees do and they are hereby authorized to order that a sidewalk be built on the South side of Nicholls Street, commencing at a point opposite the South East corner of Block No. Forty, thence West along the South side of Nicholls Street to the intersection of the South West corner of Block No. Forty-four. That said walk be built on the grade line as established by the town engineer, under and by the authority of this board. That any property owner who may desire to lay brick or cement walks, may do so on the grade established by said town engineer.  
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Section 41. Be it further ordained, &c., That the Board of Trustees do and they are hereby authorized to order that a sidewalk be built on the South side of Nicholls Street, commencing at a point opposite the South East corner of Block No. Forty, thence West along the South side of Nicholls Street to the intersection of the South West corner of Block No. Forty-four. That said walk be built on the grade line as established by the town engineer, under and by the authority of this board.
