D. 1903, before the undersigned, duly commissioned and qualified Notary Public, in and for the State and Parish aforesaid, personally came and appeared E. P. SHEAR, President and Secretary of the E. F. Walker Dry Goods Company, Limited, organized and chartered under the laws of the State of Louisiana, with its domicile and principal place of business in the town of Jennings, State of Louisiana, and the following named stockholders of said corporation, to-wit: J. H. Labit, A. D. 1903, at which meeting of the stockholders of said corporation, held at its office in Jennings, State of Louisiana, on the second day of September, A. D. 1903, at which meeting over three-fourths of the capital stock of said corporation was represented, in person and by proxy, the following resolution was unanimously adopted and made a part of the record of said meeting, to-wit: "Resolved, That the charter of the E. F. Walker Dry Goods Company, Limited, be amended, changed and altered, in the following manner, to-wit: Article third (3) of said charter shall be amended, changed and altered, to read: 'Each director of said corporation shall be elected in his own name, and not less than (1) share of the capital stock thereof, instead of 'not less than five (5) shares of the capital stock of said corporation as now provided, and said board of directors shall be composed of not less than nine (9) nor more than eleven (11) stockholders who shall be elected on the first Tuesday of January of each year, or at any meeting specially called for that purpose, instead of as provided in the charter now reads. The following stockholders being hereby added to said board of directors: S. A. Spencer, E. H. Hall, C. Clina, H. Adams, U. S. Phillips, A. C. Wilkins, and G. Hathaway. Article six (6) shall be, and is hereby amended, changed and altered, to read: 'The Secretary and Treasurer of said corporation shall be held by the same person, instead of as provided in the charter now reads. The manager of said corporation may be elected by the board of directors and shall not necessarily be the President of said company. Article nine (9) shall be, and is hereby amended, changed and altered, to read: 'The charter may be changed, modified or altered with the consent of three-fourths of the capital stock of the corporation, represented at any general meeting of the stockholders, convened for that purpose, instead of as provided in the charter now reads. Article ten (10) shall be, and is hereby amended, changed and altered, to read: 'The full effect of revoking and superceding articles or parts of articles in conflict therewith.
