

S. E. Carroll Clears \$1500 On A 35 Acre Farm.

S. E. Carroll, our popular photog-
rapher and sometimes farmer, threshed
and marketed his rice crop this week.
While Mr. Carroll's farm is more near-
ly a single field than a farm, being
but 35 acres, yet it has netted him the
net little sum of \$1500 this year,
which is not so bad when it is con-
sidered that he has hired practically
all his work done and has been but
slightly detained from his business
here in the city.

He purchased this land, which lays
just at the edge of the corporation
limits, for \$50 per acre. Last year
his crop brought him \$1785, giving
him a net gain of about \$1250. This
year he had a little better yield, bet-
ter grade and got a better price. The
crop made 12 1/2 sacks per acre and
brought \$2064. He figures his total
expenses, which were very high, owing
to scarcity of help, at \$564, leav-
ing a cash balance of \$1500.

In the past two years this 35 acre
piece of land has made its owner over
\$2700 which is more clear money than
many farmers in the older states clear
on a quarter section of land in ten
years.
