Taxation Without Representation Is Tyranny.

So said our forefathers of old, and
for this principal they fought and
bled and died through eight long years
of weary warfare, that through their
suffering they might bequeath to the
American people that most priceless
boon; the right of suffrage. So said
the manhood of France and through-
out the dark years of the French Rev-
olution, the noblest men and women
of that great nation gave their lives a
ready sacrifice on their countries altar
in order that succeeding generations
might enjoy the blessings of a free
ballot.

So say the millions of down trodden
humanity ground under the iron heel
of Russian despotism, as they willingly
sacrifice life and happiness that their
fellow men may enjoy the bless-
ings of political freedom. What is the
significance of this sacrifice of blood
and treasure for a principal? It means
that the enlightened of every country
and every age have recognized the
fact that the privilege of partici-
pating in making of the laws which
govern the country in which one lives
is the most sacred right and duty given
to man. And yet in the light of the
fact that history, Ancient and Modern
demonstrates that men of all ages
and nations have given life and treasure
to secure the privilege of the ballot,
there are a large number of American
citizens throughout this ward and
parish who willingly disfranchise
themselves, placing themselves on a
level, politically with the negro, the
idiot and the criminal, all for the sake
of one paltry dollar. This is the condition
of the man who refuses or neglects to
pay his poll tax which enables him to
become a voter in this great commonwealth
in which he lives; and makes his opinion
upon all national, state and municipal
affairs worth as much, at the polls
as that of any man in the nation. At
the recent election there were dozens
of men who, when urged to come to
the poles and vote had to admit that
they were disqualified to do so because
they had failed to pay their dollar
poll tax.

There now remains scarcely thirty
days in which to pay your poll tax
and make your calling and election
sure. Remember men if you fail to
pay your 1906 tax before the 31st day
of December that you will be debarred
from voting in the National election
of 1908, in the State election held at
that time and in the parish election
which shall elect the parish officials
for the next four years. If you are
not satisfied with the present admin-
istration of Parochial affairs, stop
kicking about it, qualify yourself to
help remedy the defects that you see.
Pay your poll tax and be men in the
fullest sense of the word.

STATE OF LOUISIANA.

PARISH OF CALCASIEU.

Charter of the Southern Implement Com-
pany Limited.

Be it known that this, the 20th day of Octo-
ber 1906, before me, J. W. Gardner, Clerk of
Court and Ex officio Notary Public in and for
Calcasieu Parish duly appointed, commis-
sioned and qualified, in the presence of the
witness hereinafter named and undersigned,
came and appeared the persons whose names
are hereunto subscribed, who severally de-
clare they availing themselves of the pro-
visions of Act 35 of the Session of 1888, ap-
proved June 20th 1888, as well as all the gen-
eral laws of the state of Louisiana relative to
the organization of corporations, they have
formed and organized, and by these presents
do form and organize themselves and their
associates and successors into a corporation
for the objects and purposes and under the
terms and stipulations herein set forth to-wit:

ARTICLE I.

The name and title of this corporation shall
be The Southern Implement Company, Lim-
ited, and under said name it shall have
and enjoy succession for the period of twenty-
five years from the date of this charter. In
said corporate name it may sue and be sued,
may hold, purchase, sell, lease, convey, and
mortgage and pledge property, both real and
personal, may have and use a corporate seal
and same to change at will. May have and
possess all powers and privileges which all cor-
porations have or may be authorized to pos-
sess. Its domicile shall be Jennings, La. Calcasieu Parish.

ARTICLE II.

The objects and purposes of this corporation
shall be to buy and sell farm machinery, ve-
hicles, harness and saddlery and sundries con-
nected with these lines.

ARTICLE III.

Citations and all legal processes shall be
served on the President, and in his absence on
the Vice-President or Secretary.

ARTICLE IV.

The capital stock of this corporation is de-
clared to be \$15,000 fifteen thousand dollars
divided into one hundred and fifty shares of
\$100 one hundred dollars each, which shall
be paid for in cash or property actually sold
or delivered to the corporation, and shall be
due and payable at such time and place as the
directors may determine. The corpora-
tion shall begin business as soon as \$15,000
ten thousand dollars have been sub-
scribed to and paid in.

ARTICLE V.

The affairs of the corporation shall be under
the management and control of the Board of
Directors, composed of three stockholders to
be elected annually at a meeting of the stock-
holders for that purpose, to be held on the 4th
Saturday of October 1907, and annually there-
after. After ten days notice given to each
stockholder by the Secretary. Each stock-
holder shall be entitled to (1) one vote for
each share of stock owned by him. Until the
first election the directors shall be M. S. Bol-
inger, J. H. Goodman and J. E. Parsons, who
shall serve until their successors are elected.

ARTICLE VI.

The officers of the corporation shall be the
President, Vice President and Secretary, and
the same shall be elected annually at the
regular annual meeting of the Board of Di-
rectors, said election to be conducted in the
usual manner, the candidates for office re-
ceiving the greatest number of votes to be de-
clared duly elected to office. Until the first
meeting the officers shall be M. S. Bolinger,
President, J. H. Goodman, Vice President and
J. E. Parsons, Secretary, who shall serve un-
til their successors are elected.

ARTICLE VII.

No stockholder shall ever be held to be li-
able or responsible for the contracts or debts of
said corporation in any further sum than the
unpaid balance due by the company on the
shares subscribed by him, nor shall any in-
formality in the organization have the ef-
fect of rendering the charter null or of ex-
posing any stockholder to any liability be-
yond the amount of stock owned or sub-
scribed to by him.

No transfer of stock by the holders there-
of shall be binding on the corporation unless
said transfer is duly entered on the books.

ARTICLE VIII.

Whenever this corporation is dissolved by
limitation or any other cause, the affairs shall
be liquidated by a Board of Liquidators to be
elected by the stockholders for that purpose.
In case of death or failure to act said remain-
ing liquidators shall appoint some one to fill
the vacancy from the stockholders of the cor-
poration.

ORDINANCE NO. 122 AMENDING ORDI- NANCE NO. 107.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of
Trustees of the Town of Welsh, La.:
That: Section 2 of Ordinance No. 107 be
amended as follows:

Section 2. That for every business of keep-
ing a barroom, cabaret, coffee house, cafe,
beer saloon, cigar shop, beer house, beer gar-
den or other place where an intoxicating li-
quor is sold or consumed, whether sold either
directly or indirectly, selling or giving away
distilled, alcoholic or malt liquors, whether
said business is carried on by itself or in con-
nection with some other business or calling,
the license shall be based on the gross annual
receipts of such business, as follows:

First class.—When said gross annual receipts
are \$25,000 or less, and over \$15,000, the li-
cense shall be \$2,750.

Second class.—When said gross annual re-
ceipts are \$15,000 or less, and over \$10,000,
the license shall be \$2,500.

Third class.—When said gross annual receipts
are \$10,000 or less, and over \$5,000, the li-
cense shall be \$2,250.


Fourth class.—When said gross annual re-
ceipts are \$5,000 or less, and over \$2,500,
the license shall be \$2,000, and provided fur-
ther that whenever any business hereto above
provided for, shall be combined with any other
business, the license shall be equal to the
license required for each business separately.

ORDINANCE NO. 123.
An ordinance regulating the use of rice chaff
as fuel by the Welsh rice mills and providing a
penalty for its violation:
Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of
Trustees of the Town of Welsh:
That: It shall be unlawful for any rice mill
situated in the corporate limits of the Town of
Welsh to burn any rice chaff in its furnaces
as fuel, without first adopting effectual means
of preventing scattering of said soot over the
town.
Be it further ordained by the Mayor and
Board of Trustees of the Town of Welsh:
That: The owners of said rice mills are
hereby granted a period of fifteen (15) days in
which to provide and put in place the neces-
sary equipments and devices for the arresting of
said soot, and suppressing said nuisance.
Be it further ordained by the Mayor and
Board of Trustees of the Town of Welsh:
That: Anyone violating this Ordinance after
the expiration of the fifteen (15) days shall
be fined in a sum not exceeding Fifty Dollars
and not less than Ten Dollars, or impris-
onment for a period not exceeding Thirty Days
nor less than Three Days.
Be it further ordained by the Mayor and
the Board of Trustees of the Town of Welsh:
That: This Ordinance take effect from and
after its promulgation.

cember, 1906.
