

NORWOOD PLANTATION SOLD.

Well Known Rice Farm Near Jennings Changes Hands.

Among the deeds filed for record in the clerk's office this morning is one showing a transfer of an interesting size. Not only is the monetary consideration large enough to be interesting, but it tells of the transfer of one of the best known pieces of rice property in the parish of Calcasieu.

The property conveyed is what is known as the old Norwood plantation, situated near Jennings, covering 700 acres of rice lands, canals, a steam boat, barges, machinery and implements. The consideration is \$39,000.

Thomas W. Taylor, William D. Evans, and Lester B. Carhart, of Franklin county, Iowa, who for some time past have owned the plantation, are named as the grantors, and John A. McCorkle, a prominent citizen of Calcasieu parish, is the grantee.—Lake Charles American.
