COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

Welsh, La. Sept. 3, 1907.

Council met in regular session. Mayor Chas. E. Carr, presiding. Members present: F. D. Calkins, E. H. Boling, Chas. Dautel, A. T. Jones and E. C. Willard.

Moved and carried that all bills O.K'd by finance committee be allowed and ordered paid.

Moved and carried that the application of Howard Boucher for janitor for the coming term of school, at \$20 per month, be accepted; said work to be done under the instructions of the principal of the school.

Moved and carried that Ordinance No. 127 be adopted.

Moved and carried that Ordinance No. 128 be adopted.

ORDINANCE NO. 127.

Ordinance to prohibit anyone from picketing or staking any animal with rope or otherwise, where said animal can interfere, range or pass on or across any of the sidewalks or streets in the town of Welsh, La.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Trustees of the Town of Welsh, La., that it shall be unlawful for any resident of the Town of Welsh, to picket, or stake with rope or otherwise, any animal in such a position or location, so that said animal can interfere, range or pass on or across any of the sidewalks, or any of the streets of the Town of Welsh.

Sec. 2. Be it further ordained, etc. That any person violating this or any part of Section one of this Ordinance, shall, upon conviction, be fined in a sum of not less than one (\$1) dollar, or more than twenty (\$20) dollars, or in default of payment of fine imposed, shall be imprisoned in the town calaboose, not less than one day nor more than twenty days, or both fined and imprisoned at the discretion of the mayor.

Sec. 3. Be it further ordained, etc. That this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its adoption and promulgation.

Sec. 4. Be it further ordained, etc. That all ordinances or parts of ordinances, in so far as they conflict herewith, be and the same are hereby repealed.

ORDINANCE NO. 128.

Ordinance providing for the levying and collection of taxes on all property, real and personal, within the corporation of the town of Welsh, La., for the year, A. D., 1907:

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Trustees, of the Town of Welsh, La.: That for the purpose of defraying the necessary expenses of the Town of Welsh, La., for the year of 1907, as per budget of expense hereunto attached, there be and hereby is levied a tax of eight mills on the dollar, of the assessed valuation of all taxable property in the Town of Welsh, La.

Sec. 2. Be it further ordained, etc. That a special tax of five mills on the dollar, of the assessed valuation for the year of 1907, of all the taxable property, real and personal, situated in the Town of Welsh, La., be and the same is hereby levied for the maintenance of public schools in the Town of Welsh, La.,

Sec. 3.—Be it further ordained, etc. That all taxes hereby levied, shall be a lien and privilege on all taxable property, paramount to all other liens, state and parish taxes excepted, and shall be due at the same time and be collected in the same manner as provided for the collection of state and parish taxes.

Sec. 4. Be it further ordained, etc. That all taxes hereby levied, shall become delinquent on and after the first day of January, and if not paid when due, shall draw interest at the rate of 2 per cent. per month from January 1, 1907, until paid.
