LONG DROUTH SETS IN.

Leesburg Ward Has Voted Out Liquor at Special Election.

The people of Cameron parish who have a desire for liquor will be obliged to go outside of the parish for it after January 1st. The only ward of the parish in which liquor can be legally sold is the Leesburg ward, and at a special election yesterday it went dry by 31 majority.

For some years the parish has been practically prohibition, the license being fixed at a sum that made it so. Last summer, however, a saloon was opened at Cameron, its proprietor paying the license demanded, and the temperance people of the parish decided to make its continuance impossible on any terms.—Lake Charles American.
