### ORDINANCE

tion of taxes on all of the taxable property within the corporation of the Town of Welsh, La., for the year of

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Town of Welsh, La.: That for the purpose of defraying the expenses of e Town of Welsh, La , for the year of 1908, as per budget of expense herein incorporated, that a tax of ten mills on the dollar be, and the same is hereby assessed on the assessed valuation on all the taxable property

in the Town of Welsh, La Sec. 2. Be it further ordained, etc. That by authority of an Ordinance adopted by the Board of Trustees and the Property Taxpayers of the Town of Welsh, La., on June 7, 1904, providing for special school tax of 5 mills upon the assessed valuation of the Town of Welsh, La., for the mainyears from the above date, therefore a special tax of 5 mills is hereby levied on the assessed valuation of all taxable property in the town of Welsh, La., for the maintainance of public schools.

Sec. 3. Be it further ordained, etc. That all taxes shall become a lien and privilege, on all taxable property, paramount to all other liens, State and Parish taxes excepted, and shall become delinquent at the same time and be collected in the same manner as provided for the collection of State and Parish taxes.

Sec, 4. Be it further ordained, etc.: That all taxes herein levied, shall become idelinquent January 1st, 1908, and shall draw interest at the rate of 2 per cent per month until paid. Sec. 5. Budget of expense:

For secretary and tax collector \$ 350.00 Marshall's salary..... 500.00 Public improvements: streets and bridges..... 2000.00 Public schools as provided by

State Law, or three mills on the assessed valuation of the Town of Welsh, La...... 1050.00
