Remarkable has been the career of F. C. Selous, the famous hunter and explorer, who accompanies Mr. Roosevelt on his African big-game expedition. He was only 20 years of age when he went to Matabeleland, in days when railroads were unknown there and when the interior of the country was a sealed book to the European. For years he was in unknown countries hunting elephants, lions and other animals and at one period he was nearly three years without seeing a newspaper, a telegram or any kind of money and he was perfectly happy. He spent nearly a quarter of a century of his life penetrating the interior of South Africa. Then he went to Alaska on a 15,000-mile tour in search of moose and caribou.

HOMESICK INDIANS DIE.
One of the most pathetic instances of homesickness is that of which the Modoc Indians are said to be the victims. After more than thirty years of waiting the Modocs, who because of their warring upon white settlers in Oregon, were exiled to Indian Territory and placed upon the Quaraw reservation, are being sent back to their native home. At that time there were 217 of the tribe and to-day they number only 49. Senator Curtis of Kansas, himself an Indian, in his plea for the return of the remnant of the tribe, gives it as his opinion that the mental anxiety brought about by their enforced separation from family and friends is the cause of this rapid decrease in their numbers.—Vogue.
