**Anti-Divisionists Held Rousing
Meeting Monday Night.**

The anti-divisionists of Welsh

fest in the Auditorium Monday
evening, preceding the election.

A good sized crowd of voters

excellent music for the occasion.

The meeting was presided over
by Hon. C. E. Carr, president of
Welsh division of the Anti-Division-
League.

The speakers of the evening
were Messrs. W. B. Gabbert, D. R. Jones,
Dr. Jno. H. Cooper, Mayor A. J. Jones
and Hon. L. E. Robinson, of whom
discussed certain phases of the
parish division question, and
brought out points that called for
hearty applause from the audience.

While there were but few, if any,
divisionists in the audience to be
convicted, yet it is safe to assert that
the meeting did good in arousing the
interest of the voters to the necessity
of coming out and voting at this
election.

Aside from the Welsh people,
number of voters were over from
Lake Charles, who took a lively interest
in the meeting.

**Jennings and Crowley Divisionists
Held Rally Here Saturday Night.**

A fair sized house, including
a goodly number of Welsh voters
some fifty to a hundred Jennings
divisionists assembled in the Auditorium
Saturday night to listen to the Hon.
J. O. Modisette and Rev. Jas. H. Hill,
of Jennings and Prof. Lewis of Crow-
ley, elucidate their views on the sub-
ject of parish division.

Being unable to secure any divi-
sionist to act as chairman of the meet-
ing, Mr. W. B. Gabbert, one of the
staunchest anti-divisionists, consented
to act in that capacity.

The speakers of the evening did
their best, and may be said to have
been fairly successful in furnishing an
evening's entertainment for their au-
dience, although, of course, they did
not convince anybody of the advan-
tages of division, nor make a single
vote. They were courteously treated
by their Welsh friends, who recognize
the Jennings men as good fellows and
friends.

On behalf of the voters of Welsh,
we extend to the Jennings fellows a
cordial invitation to come over and
help us rejoice over the prodigal's
return, now that it is all over.

**Carelessness On Part of Workman En-
tails \$300 Loss and Delays Com-
pletion of New Brick Building.**

Monday, while the workmen on the
new brick block that is being erected
here, were engaged in putting in the
large plate glass of the front windows,
an accident occurred that entails a
heavy loss to the contractors and at
the same time, will delay the comple-
tion of the building for perhaps three
or four weeks.

While several of the workmen were
removing one of the large plate glass
to put it in place, one of them was
left to steady the remaining ones,
which were standing on edge, and be-
coming interested in conversation, it
seems he forgot his charge and let the
whole amount of glass fall to the floor,
with the result that seven of them
were broken.

The contractor estimates his loss at
about \$300, aside from the delay oc-
casioned by the destruction of the
glass. The contractor immediately
wired an order for a new shipment of
glass, to take the place of those which
were broken. It is estimated that it
will likely be several weeks before the
new glass will be here.

**L. G. Lewis Installing Gasoline Engine
for Electric Lighting Plant for
Robinson Block.**

An Olds gasoline engine arrived
Wednesday from the factory and is
being installed this week by L. G.
Lewis, for the electric lighting plant
of the Robinson block. It is expected
that this plant will supply abundant
lighting and fan power for all the es-
tablishments in this block, although
there are two of the firms that are not
in on it yet, as they contemplate put-
ting in a plant of their own, not only
to furnish light, but power for other
lines of work.

**J. M. Barnett Cement Co. Putting in
Cement Floor in New Crescent
Building This Week.**

Work on the Crescent Drug Store
building is progressing rapidly this
week. Mr. Barnett is putting down
the cement floor and will likely have
it completed by the last of the week.
This promises to be one of the hand-

completed.
